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Sec. 202. The appropriations authorized under this part and
 part 1 are subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
 MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594.

Sec. 203. As used in this part and part 1:

5 (a) "Department" means the Michigan department of education.
6 (b) "District" means a local school district as that term is
7 defined in section 6 of the revised school code, 1976 PA 451, MCL
8 380.6, or a public school academy as that term is defined in
9 section 5 of the revised school code, 1976 PA 451, MCL 380.5.

10

(c) "FTE" means full-time equated.

Sec. 204. The departments and agencies receiving appropriations in part 1 shall use the internet to fulfill the reporting requirements of this part. This requirement may include transmission of reports via electronic mail to the recipients identified for each reporting requirement, or it may include placement of reports on an internet or intranet site.

17 Sec. 205. Funds appropriated in part 1 shall not be used for the purchase of foreign goods or services, or both, if 18 competitively priced and of comparable quality American goods or 19 services, or both, are available. Preference shall be given to 20 21 goods or services, or both, manufactured or provided by Michigan businesses, if they are competitively priced and of comparable 22 quality. In addition, preference should be given to goods or 23 24 services, or both, that are manufactured or provided by Michigan 25 businesses owned and operated by veterans, if they are competitively priced and of comparable quality. 26

27 Sec. 206. The state superintendent of public instruction shall
28 take all reasonable steps to ensure businesses in deprived and
29 depressed communities compete for and perform contracts to provide



services or supplies, or both. The state superintendent of public
 instruction shall strongly encourage firms with which the
 department contracts to subcontract with certified businesses in
 depressed and deprived communities for services, supplies, or both.

Sec. 207. The departments and agencies receiving 5 6 appropriations in part 1 shall prepare a report on out-of-state 7 travel expenses not later than January 1 of each year. The travel 8 report shall be a listing of all travel by classified and unclassified employees outside this state in the immediately 9 10 preceding fiscal year that was funded in whole or in part with 11 funds appropriated in the department's budget. The report shall be 12 submitted to the senate and house appropriations committees, the 13 house and senate fiscal agencies, and the state budget director. 14 The report must include the following information:

15

(a) The dates of each travel occurrence.

16 (b) The transportation and related costs of each travel 17 occurrence, including the proportion funded with state general 18 fund/general purpose revenues, the proportion funded with state 19 restricted revenues, the proportion funded with federal revenues, 20 and the proportion funded with other revenues.

Sec. 208. Funds appropriated in part 1 shall not be used by a principal executive department, state agency, or authority to hire a person to provide legal services that are the responsibility of the attorney general. This prohibition does not apply to legal services for bonding activities and for those outside services that the attorney general authorizes.

27 Sec. 209. Not later than November 30, the state budget office
28 shall prepare and transmit a report that provides for estimates of
29 the total general fund/general purpose appropriation lapses at the



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close of the prior fiscal year. This report shall summarize the
 projected year-end general fund/general purpose appropriation
 lapses by major departmental program or program areas. The report
 shall be transmitted to the chairpersons of the senate and house
 appropriations committees and the senate and house fiscal agencies.

Sec. 211. The department shall cooperate with the department
of technology, management, and budget to maintain a searchable
website accessible by the public at no cost that includes, but is
not limited to, all of the following for each department or agency:

(a) Fiscal year-to-date expenditures by category.

10 11

(b) Fiscal year-to-date expenditures by appropriation unit.

12 (c) Fiscal year-to-date payments to a selected vendor,
13 including the vendor name, payment date, payment amount, and
14 payment description.

15 (d) The number of active department employees by job16 classification.

17

(e) Job specifications and wage rates.

Sec. 212. Within 14 days after the release of the executive 18 budget recommendation, the department shall cooperate with the 19 20 state budget office to provide the senate and house appropriations 21 chairs, the chairs of the senate and house appropriations subcommittees responsible for the department budget, and the senate 22 and house fiscal agencies with an annual report on estimated state 23 restricted fund balances, state restricted fund projected revenues, 24 25 and state restricted fund expenditures for the fiscal years ending September 30, 2019 and September 30, 2020. 26

27 Sec. 213. The department shall maintain, on a publicly
28 accessible website, a department scorecard that identifies, tracks,
29 and regularly updates key metrics that are used to monitor and



1 improve the department's performance.

Sec. 214. Total authorized appropriations from all sources
under part 1 for legacy costs for the fiscal year ending September
30, 2020 are estimated at \$14,654,400.00. From this amount, total
agency appropriations for pension-related legacy costs are
estimated at \$7,123,800.00. Total agency appropriations for retiree
health care legacy costs are estimated at \$7,530,600.00.

8 Sec. 215. The department shall provide through the internet 9 the state board of education agenda and all supporting documents, 10 and shall notify the state budget director and the senate and house 11 fiscal agencies that the agenda and supporting documents are 12 available on the internet, at the time the agenda and supporting 13 documents are provided to state board of education members.

Sec. 217. The department may assist the department of health and human services, other departments, and local school districts to secure reimbursement for eligible services provided in Michigan schools from the federal Medicaid program. The department may submit reports of direct expenses related to this effort to the department of health and human services for reimbursement.

Sec. 219. From the funds appropriated in part 1, the department shall ensure that kindergarten benchmark data include a method for information to be provided regarding a child's participation in the great start readiness program.

Sec. 220. The department shall post on its website a link to the federal Institute of Education Sciences' What Works Clearinghouse. The department also shall work to disseminate knowledge about the What Works Clearinghouse to districts and intermediate districts so that it may be used to improve reading proficiency for pupils in grades K to 3.



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Sec. 221. The department shall require all districts and intermediate school districts to maintain complete records within the personnel file of a teacher or school employee of any disciplinary actions taken by the governing board against the teacher or employee for sexual misconduct. The records shall not be destroyed or removed from the teacher's or employee's personnel file except as required by a court order.

8 Sec. 222. The department shall not take disciplinary action
9 against an employee who communicates truthfully and factually with
10 a member of the legislature or his or her staff.

Sec. 223. The department and agencies receiving appropriations in part 1 shall receive and retain copies of all reports funded from appropriations in part 1. Federal and state guidelines for short-term and long-term retention of records shall be followed. The department may electronically retain copies of reports unless otherwise required by federal and state guidelines.

Sec. 225. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1, the
department must comply with section 17c of the state school aid act
of 1979, 1979 PA 94, MCL 388.1617c.

20 (2) If the department fails to comply with subsection (1), the
21 state funds appropriated in part 1 for unclassified positions,
22 state board/superintendent operations, school support services
23 operations, and field services operations shall each be reduced by
24 2.5%.

Sec. 226. From the funds appropriated in part 1, the department shall coordinate with the other departments to streamline state services and resources, reduce duplication, and increase efficiency. This includes, but is not limited to, working with the department of treasury to coordinate with the financial



1 independence team and overseeing deficit districts and working with 2 the department of health and human services and department of 3 licensing and regulatory affairs to coordinate with early childhood 4 programs and overseeing child care providers.

Sec. 227. (1) The department shall provide data requested by a member of the legislature, his or her staff, or the house and senate fiscal agencies in a timely manner. If the department fails to provide reasonably requested data within 30 days after the request, the state money appropriated in part 1 for state board/superintendent operations shall be reduced by 1%.

11 (2) If the department fails to provide to the legislature 12 reports and other data required by boilerplate or statute within 30 13 days after the date the information is due, the state money 14 appropriated in part 1 for state board/superintendent operations 15 shall be reduced by 1%.

Sec. 229. The department shall not enter into a contract funded under part 1 that exceeds \$1,000,000.00, submit federal accountability plans, or request amendments to federal accountability plans until after notification of the content to both the house and senate appropriations committees and the state budget director.

Sec. 230. From the funds appropriated in part 1, the 22 23 department shall compile a report that identifies any new, or lack 24 thereof, mandates required of nonpublic schools. In compiling the 25 report, the department may consult with relevant statewide education associations in Michigan. The report compiled by the 26 27 department shall indicate the type of mandate, including, but not limited to, student health, student or building safety, 28 29 accountability, and educational requirements, and shall indicate



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whether a school has to report on the specified mandates. The report required under this section shall be completed by April 1, 2020 and transmitted to the state budget director, the house and senate appropriations subcommittees responsible for the department of education, and the senate and house fiscal agencies not later than April 15, 2020.

7 Sec. 231. From the funds appropriated in part 1, the 8 department shall collect information from all school districts, intermediate school districts, and public school academies that 9 10 have not adopted any policies that were specified by section 12b of 11 the child protection law, 1975 PA 238, MCL 722.632b, during the 12 fiscal year ending September 30, 2018, or that adopted new policies specified by section 12b of the child protection law, 1975 PA 238, 13 14 MCL 722.632b, during the fiscal year ending September 30, 2019. The 15 information collected shall be reported to the house and senate 16 appropriations committees, the house and senate fiscal agencies, 17 and the state budget office. The report shall include a list of each school district, intermediate school district, and public 18 school academy that has adopted each policy specified by section 19 12b of the child protection law, 1975 PA 238, MCL 722.632b. 20

Sec. 232. From the funds appropriated in part 1, the department shall ensure that the most recently issued report of regional in-demand occupations issued by the department of technology, management, and budget is distributed in electronic or paper form to all high schools in each school district, intermediate school district, and public school academy.

Sec. 233. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1, the
department shall develop and implement a training program to
provide resources and programming to pupils in grades 9 to 12 who

1 are interested in a career in teaching and who are members of

2 groups that are underrepresented in the teaching profession in this 3 state.

4 (2) The department shall do all of the following with respect
5 to the training program developed and implemented under subsection
6 (1):

7 (a) Create a process for nomination and admission of pupils to8 the program.

9

(b) Advertise the program.

10 (c) Invite postsecondary institutions in this state that 11 operate a teacher preparation program to participate in the 12 training program.

13 (d) Connect pupils participating in the program to
14 representatives of teacher preparation programs at postsecondary
15 institutions in this state.

16 (e) At least once, conduct conferences for pupils
17 participating in the program in locations that are geographically
18 convenient for the majority of pupils attending each conference.

(f) Provide all available research and resources to pupils and postsecondary institutions participating in the training program on at least all of the following:

(i) Successful activities and programs for recruiting and
 retaining pupils who are members of groups that are
 underrepresented in the teaching profession for participation in

29 STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION/OFFICE OF THE SUPERINTENDENT



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Sec. 301. (1) The appropriations in part 1 may be used for per
 diem payments to the state board for meetings at which a quorum is
 present or for performing official business authorized by the state
 board. The per diem payments shall be at a rate as follows:

(a) State board of education - president - \$110.00 per day.

6 (b) State board of education - member other than president 7 \$100.00 per day.

8 (2) A state board of education member shall not be paid a per9 diem for more than 30 days per year.

Sec. 302. From the amount appropriated in part 1 to the state board of education, not more than \$35,000.00 shall be expended in the current fiscal year for in-state travel and out-of-state travel directly related to the duties of the state board of education.

15 CENTRAL SUPPORT

Sec. 325. Within 10 days of the receipt of a grant appropriated in the federal and private grants line item in part 1, the department shall notify the house and senate chairpersons of the appropriations subcommittees responsible for the department budget, the house and senate fiscal agencies, and the state budget director of the receipt of the grant, including the funding source, purpose, and amount of the grant.

24 SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES

Sec. 350. From the funds in part 1 for special education operations, the department shall use \$100,000.00 to design and distribute to all parents and legal guardians of a student with a disability information about federal and state mandates regarding the rights and protections of students with disabilities,



including, but not limited to, individualized education programs to ensure that parents and legal guardians are fully informed about laws, rules, procedural safeguards, problem-solving options, and any other information the department determines is necessary so that parents and legal guardians may be able to provide meaningful input in collaboration with districts to develop and implement an individualized education program.

8

9 MICHIGAN SCHOOLS FOR THE DEAF AND BLIND

Sec. 401. The employees at the Michigan Schools for the Deaf and Blind who work on a school-year basis are considered annual employees for purposes of service credits, retirement, and insurance benefits.

Sec. 402. For each student enrolled at the Michigan Schools for the Deaf and Blind, the department shall assess the intermediate school district of residence 100% of the cost of operating the student's instructional program. The amount shall exclude room and board related costs and the cost of weekend transportation between the school and the student's home.

Sec. 406. (1) The Michigan Schools for the Deaf and Blind may promote its residential program as a possible appropriate option for children who are deaf or hard of hearing or who are blind or visually impaired. The Michigan Schools for the Deaf and Blind shall distribute information detailing its services to all intermediate school districts in this state.

26 (2) Upon knowledge of or recognition by an intermediate school
27 district that a child in the district is deaf or hard of hearing or
28 blind or visually impaired, the intermediate school district shall
29 provide to the parents of the child the literature distributed by



1 the Michigan Schools for the Deaf and Blind to intermediate school 2 districts under subsection (1).

3 (3) Parents will continue to have a choice regarding the4 educational placement of their deaf or hard-of-hearing children.

Sec. 407. Revenue received by the Michigan Schools for the
Deaf and Blind from gifts, bequests, and donations that is
unexpended at the end of the state fiscal year may be carried over
to the succeeding fiscal year and shall not revert to the general
fund.

Sec. 408. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 for the low incidence outreach fund are appropriated from money collected by the Michigan Schools for the Deaf and Blind and the low incidence outreach program for providing qualified services and may be used for any expenses necessary to provide the qualified services. Any money that is unexpended at the end of the current fiscal year may be carried forward into the succeeding fiscal year.

17 (2) As used in this section, "qualified services" means
18 document reproduction and services; conducting conferences,
19 workshops, and training classes; and providing specialized
20 equipment, facilities, and software.

Sec. 409. When conducting a due process hearing resulting from a parent's appeal of his or her child's individualized education program team's decision on the child's educational placement, a state administrative law judge shall consider designating the Michigan Schools for the Deaf and Blind as the least restrictive environment under federal law for the parent's child who is deaf, deafblind, or hard of hearing.

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1 2 Sec. 501. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for educator excellence, the department shall maintain certificate revocation/felony conviction files of educational personnel.

3

Sec. 503. From the funds appropriated in part 1, the 4 5 department shall, upon request, consult with the Michigan Virtual 6 Learning Research Institute and external stakeholders in connection 7 with the department's implementation and administration of 8 professional development training described in section 35a of the state school aid act of 1979, 1979 PA 94, MCL 388.1635a, including, 9 10 but not limited to, the online training of educators of pupils in 11 grades K to 3 described in that section.

Sec. 506. Revenue received from teacher testing fees that is unexpended at the end of the current fiscal year may be carried over to the succeeding fiscal year and shall not revert to the general fund.

Sec. 507. From the funds appropriated in part 1, the department shall adopt a teacher certification test that ensures that all newly certified elementary teachers have the skills to deliver evidence-based literacy instruction. The department may use teacher certification or teacher testing fee revenue to the extent allowable under law to implement this section, or may pass along increased testing fees to teachers as allowable and appropriate.

15 LIBRARY OF MICHIGAN

Sec. 801. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 for library fees are appropriated from money collected by the Library of Michigan for providing qualified services and may be used for any expenses necessary to provide the qualified services. Any money that is unexpended at the end of the current fiscal year may be carried forward into the succeeding fiscal year.

(2) As used in this section, "qualified services" means
document reproduction and services; conducting conferences,
workshops, and training classes; and providing specialized
equipment, facilities, and software.

Sec. 803. It is the intent of the legislature that the Library of Michigan and the component programs currently within the Library of Michigan with the exception of the genealogical collections shall be kept together in a state department.



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Sec. 804. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 for renaissance 1 zone reimbursements shall be used to reimburse public libraries 2 under section 12 of the Michigan renaissance zone act, 1996 PA 376, 3 MCL 125.2692, for taxes levied in 2019. The allocations shall be 4 5 made not later than 60 days after the department of treasury 6 certifies to the department and to the state budget director that 7 the department of treasury has received all necessary information to properly determine the amounts due to each eligible recipient. 8
