3 (a) "Department" means the department of environment, Great4 Lakes, and energy.

5 (b) "Director" means the director of the department.

6 (c) "FTE" means full-time equated.

7 (d) "IDG" means interdepartmental grant.

8 (e) "NPDES" means national pollution discharge elimination9 system.

Sec. 204. The departments and agencies receiving appropriations in part 1 shall use the internet to fulfill the reporting requirements of this part. This requirement may include transmission of reports via electronic mail to the recipients identified for each reporting requirement, or it may include placement of reports on an internet or intranet site.

16 Sec. 205. Funds appropriated in part 1 shall not be used for 17 the purchase of foreign goods or services, or both, if 18 competitively priced and of comparable quality American goods or 19 services, or both, are available. Preference shall be given to 20 goods or services, or both, manufactured or provided by Michigan 21 businesses if they are competitively priced and of comparable 22 quality. In addition, preference shall be given to goods or 23 services, or both, that are manufactured or provided by Michigan 24 businesses owned and operated by veterans, if they are 25 competitively priced and of comparable quality.

26 Sec. 206. The director shall take all reasonable steps to27 ensure businesses in deprived and depressed communities compete for

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and perform contracts to provide services or supplies, or both. The
 director shall strongly encourage firms with which the department
 contracts to subcontract with certified businesses in depressed and
 deprived communities for services, supplies, or both.

5 Sec. 207. The departments and agencies receiving 6 appropriations in part 1 shall prepare a report on out-of-state travel expenses not later than January 1 of each year. The travel 7 report shall be a listing of all travel by classified and 8 9 unclassified employees outside this state in the immediately 10 preceding fiscal year that was funded in whole or in part with 11 funds appropriated in the department's budget. The report shall be 12 submitted to the house and senate appropriations committees, the 13 house and senate fiscal agencies, and the state budget director. 14 The report shall include the following information:

(a) The dates of each travel occurrence.

(b) The total transportation and related costs of each travel occurrence, including the proportion funded with state general fund/general purpose revenues, the proportion funded with state restricted revenues, the proportion funded with federal revenues, and the proportion funded with other revenues.

Sec. 208. Funds appropriated in part 1 shall not be used by a principal executive department, state agency, or authority to hire a person to provide legal services that are the responsibility of the attorney general. This prohibition does not apply to legal services for bonding activities and for those activities that the attorney general authorizes.

Sec. 209. Not later than November 30, the state budget office

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1 shall prepare and transmit a report that provides for estimates of 2 the total general fund/general purpose appropriation lapses at the 3 close of the prior fiscal year. This report shall summarize the 4 projected year-end general fund/general purpose appropriation 5 lapses by major departmental program or program areas. 26 Sec. 212. Within 14 days after the release of the executive 27 budget recommendation, the department shall cooperate with the

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state budget office to provide the senate and house appropriations chairs, the senate and house appropriations subcommittee chairs, and the senate and house fiscal agencies with an annual report on estimated state restricted fund balances, state restricted fund projected revenues, and state restricted fund expenditures for the fiscal years ending September 30, 2019 and September 30, 2020.

7 Sec. 213. The department shall maintain, on a publicly
8 accessible website, a department scorecard that identifies, tracks,
9 and regularly updates key metrics that are used to monitor and
10 improve the agency's performance.

Sec. 214. Total authorized appropriations from all sources under part 1 for legacy costs for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2020 are estimated at \$31,893,100.00. From this amount, total agency appropriations for pension-related legacy costs are estimated at \$15,504,000.00. Total agency appropriations for retiree health care legacy costs are estimated at \$16,389,100.00.

17 Sec. 216. (1) The department shall report all of the following 18 information relative to allocations made from appropriations for 19 the environmental cleanup and redevelopment program, state 20 cleanups, emergency actions, superfund cleanups, the revitalization 21 revolving loan program, the brownfield grants and loans program, 22 the leaking underground storage tank cleanup program, the 23 contaminated lake and river sediments cleanup program, the refined 24 petroleum product cleanup program, and the environmental protection 25 bond projects under section 19508(7) of the natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.19508, to the 26 27 state budget director, the senate and house appropriations

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1 subcommittees on environmental quality, and the senate and house 2 fiscal agencies:

3 (a) The name and location of the site for which an allocation4 is made.

5 (b) The nature of the problem encountered at the site.

6 (c) A brief description of how the problem will be resolved if7 the allocation is made for a response activity.

8 (d) The estimated date that site closure activities will be9 completed.

10 (e) The amount of the allocation, or the anticipated financing11 for the site.

12 (f) A summary of the sites and the total amount of funds13 expended at the sites by September 30, 2020.

14 (g) The number of brownfield projects that were successfully15 redeveloped.

16 (2) The report prepared under subsection (1) shall also17 include all of the following:

(b) The report shall include the total amount of funds
expended during the fiscal year and the total amount of funds
awaiting expenditure.

(c) The total amount of bonds issued for the environmental
protection bond program pursuant to part 193 of the natural
resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL
324.19301 to 324.19306, and bonds issued pursuant to the clean

2 (3) The report shall be made available by March 31 of each3 year.

(4) Unexpended and unencumbered amounts remaining from
appropriations from the refined petroleum fund activities contained
in 2007 PA 121, 2008 PA 247, 2009 PA 118, 2010 PA 189, 2011 PA 63,
2012 PA 200, 2013 PA 59, 2014 PA 252, 2015 PA 84, 2016 PA 268, 2017
PA 107, and 2018 PA 207 are appropriated for expenditure for any

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site listed in this part and part 1 and any site listed in the
 public acts referenced in this section.

3 (5) Unexpended and unencumbered amounts remaining from the
4 appropriations from the strategic water quality initiatives fund
5 contained in 2011 PA 50, 2011 PA 63, 2012 PA 200, 2013 PA 59, 2014
6 PA 252, 2015 PA 84, 2016 PA 268, 2017 PA 107, and 2018 PA 207 are
7 appropriated for expenditure for any site listed in this part and
8 part 1 and any site listed in the public acts referenced in this
9 section.

Sec. 219. Unexpended settlement revenues at the end of the fiscal year may be carried forward into the settlement fund in the succeeding fiscal year up to a maximum carryforward of \$2,500,000.00.

Sec. 220. The department shall not take disciplinary action
against an employee for communicating with a member of the
legislature or his or her staff.

Sec. 221. (1) Funds appropriated in part 1 shall not be used by the department to promulgate a rule that will apply to a small business and that will have a disproportionate economic impact on small businesses because of the size of those businesses if the department fails to reduce the disproportionate economic impact of the rule on small businesses as provided under section 40 of the administrative procedures act of 1969, 1969 PA 306, MCL 24.240.

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(2) As used in this section:

(a) "Rule" means that term as defined under section 7 of theadministrative procedures act of 1969, 1969 PA 306, MCL 24.207.

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(b) "Small business" means that term as defined under section

23 (b) The purpose for each expenditure.

24 (c) The status of programs supported by this funding.

25 (d) A brief description of how related problems have been or 26 will be resolved if expenditures are made for immediate response. (e) The job titles and number of departmental FTEs engaged in

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1 the Flint declaration of emergency response effort.

Sec. 237. From the funds appropriated in part 1, the department shall be responsible for the necessary and reasonable attorney fees and costs incurred by private and independent legal counsel chosen by current and former classified and unclassified department employees in the defense of the department employees named as a party in any state or federal lawsuits or investigations related to the city of Flint municipal water system.

9 Sec. 238. From funds appropriated in part 1, the department 10 shall post the following on the department's publicly accessible 11 website:

12 (a) By November 1, a report listing each fee the department 13 assessed during the previous fiscal year. to the environmental protection fund created in section 503a of the

17 (2) By January 1, the department shall provide a report to the
18 house and senate subcommittees on environmental quality and the

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Sec. 412. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for
 surface water, \$675,000.00 in grant funds shall be awarded to
 watershed councils for education, administration, and conservation
 efforts. A grant to an individual watershed council shall not
 exceed \$40,000.00.

6 (2) On or before April 1, the department shall transmit to the 7 appropriations subcommittees, the fiscal agencies, and the state budget office and post on the department's website a report on the 8 9 previous calendar year's activities of the watershed grant program. 10 The report shall include a list of all grantees and award amounts. 11 Sec. 413. From funds appropriated in part 1 for surface water, 12 \$150,000.00 is allocated to the continuation of the department's 13 contract for the cooperative lakes monitoring program to ensure the 14 continued operation of the program.

15 RENEWING MICHIGAN'S ENVIRONMENT

Sec. 503. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for renewing Michigan's environment program, \$500,000.00 is allocated for the Michigan geological survey.

19 CLIMATE AND ENERGY

20 Sec. 601. The department shall enter into a memorandum of 21 understanding with the public service commission to outline the 22 responsibilities to be served by the office of climate and energy.

23 UNDERGROUND STORAGE TANK AUTHORITY

24 Sec. 701. The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for the

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underground storage tank cleanup program are designated as a work project appropriation, and any unencumbered or unallotted funds shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year and shall be available for expenditures for projects under this section until the projects have been completed. The following is in compliance with section 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

8 (a) The purpose of the project is to provide contaminated site9 cleanup.

10 (b) The project will be accomplished by contract.

11 (c) The total estimated cost of the project is \$20,000,000.00.

(1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for PFAS and emerging contaminants, \$15,000,000.00 is allocated for a grant 6 7 program for municipal airports for costs of monitoring and additional testing related to PFAS testing results. From the 8 9 remaining funds, the department shall award grants for up to \$5,000,000.00 to drinking water systems for contaminant remediation 10 11 efforts or connection to an alternate system as well as to invest 12 in technologies to address contaminants in public water systems.

(2) On or before April 1, the department shall transmit to the appropriations subcommittees, the fiscal agencies, and the state budget office and post on the department's website a report on the previous calendar year's activities funded with PFAS and emerging contaminants funds. The report shall include a list of all grantees and award amounts.

Sec. 1003. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for drinking water revolving fund loan forgiveness, the department shall award grants for drinking water infrastructure upgrades included in community asset management plans. An applicant is eligible for annual grant funding for 30% of the total project cost or \$2,000,000.00, whichever is less.

(2) On or before April 1, the department shall transmit to the
appropriations subcommittees, the fiscal agencies, and the state
budget office and post on the department's website a report on the

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1 previous calendar year's activities funded with drinking water 2 revolving fund loan forgiveness funds. The report shall include a 3 list of all grantees and award amounts.

4 Sec. 1004. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for 5 affordability and planning, the department shall award grants to 6 communities for 1 or more of the following:

7 (a) To enhance asset management plans.

(b) To develop sustainable water rate plans.

9 (c) To develop watershed plans.

10 (2) Grants under subsection (1) shall be awarded on a 11 competitive basis and shall not exceed \$500,000.00 for an 12 individual grant applicant. If a region applies on behalf of 13 multiple community water supplies, the maximum grant shall not exceed \$2,000,000.00. 14

(3) On or before April 1, the department shall transmit to the 15 16 appropriations subcommittees, the fiscal agencies, and the state 17 budget office and post on the department's website a report on the 18 previous calendar year's activities funded with affordability and 19 planning funds. The report shall include a list of all grantees and 20 award amounts.

21 Sec. 1005. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for 22 private well testing, the department shall award grants to local 23 health departments to provide free or low-cost water testing to 24 private well owners. Testing offered shall include coliforms, 25 nitrates/nitrites, arsenic, and other contaminants as determined by 26 application.

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(2) On or before April 1, the department shall transmit to the

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appropriations subcommittees, the fiscal agencies, and the state budget office and post on the department's website a report on the previous calendar year's activities funded with private well testing funds. The report shall include a list of all grantees and award amounts.
