## SUBSTITUTE FOR HOUSE BILL NO. 6103

A bill to amend 1949 PA 300, entitled "Michigan vehicle code,"

by amending section 698 (MCL 257.698), as amended by 2018 PA 342.

## THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Sec. 698. (1) A motor vehicle may be equipped with not more
- 2 than 2 side cowl or fender lamps that emit an amber or white light
- 3 without glare.
- 4 (2) A motor vehicle may be equipped with not more than 1
- 5 running board courtesy lamp on each side that emits a white or
- 6 amber light without glare.
- 7 (3) Backing lights of red, amber, or white may be mounted on
- 8 the rear of a motor vehicle if the switch controlling the light is
- 9 so arranged that the light may be turned on only if the vehicle is
- 10 in reverse gear. The backing lights when unlighted shall be covered

- 1 or otherwise arranged so as not to reflect objectionable glare in
- 2 the eyes of an operator of a vehicle approaching from the rear.
- 3 (4) Unless both—covered and—OR unlit, a vehicle operated on
- 4 the highways of this state shall not be equipped with a lamp or a
- 5 part designed to be a reflector unless expressly required or
- 6 permitted by this chapter or that meets the standards prescribed in
- 7 49 CFR 571.108. A lamp or a part designed to be a reflector, if
- 8 visible from the front, shall display or reflect a white or amber
- 9 light; if visible from either side, shall display or reflect an
- 10 amber or red light; and if visible from the rear, shall display or
- 11 reflect a red light, except as otherwise provided by law.
- 12 (5) The use or possession of flashing, oscillating, or
- 13 rotating lights of any color is prohibited except as otherwise
- 14 provided by law, or under the following circumstances:
- 15 (a) A police vehicle shall be equipped with flashing,
- 16 rotating, or oscillating red or blue lights, for use in the
- 17 performance of police duties.
- 18 (b) A fire vehicle or ambulance available for public use or
- 19 for use of the United States, this state, or any unit of this
- 20 state, whether publicly or privately owned, shall be equipped with
- 21 flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights and used as required
- 22 for safety.
- 23 (c) An authorized emergency vehicle may be equipped with
- 24 flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights for use when
- 25 responding to an emergency call if when in use the flashing,
- 26 rotating, or oscillating red lights are clearly visible in a 360-
- 27 degree arc from a distance of 500 feet when in use. A person

- 1 operating lights under this subdivision at any time other than when
- 2 responding to an emergency call is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- 3 (d) Flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber or green lights,
- 4 placed in a position as to be visible throughout an arc of 360
- 5 degrees, shall be used by a state, county, or municipal vehicle
- 6 engaged in the removal of ice, snow, or other material from the
- 7 highway and in other operations designed to control ice and snow,
- 8 or engaged in other non-winter operations. This subdivision does
- 9 not prohibit the use of a flashing, rotating, or oscillating green
- 10 light by a fire service.
- 11 (e) A vehicle used for the cleanup of spills or a necessary
- 12 emergency response action taken pursuant to state or federal law or
- 13 a vehicle operated by an employee of the department of natural
- 14 resources or the department of environmental quality that responds
- 15 to a spill, emergency response action, complaint, or compliance
- 16 activity may be equipped with flashing, rotating, or oscillating
- 17 amber or green lights. The lights described in this subdivision
- 18 shall not be activated unless the vehicle is at the scene of a
- 19 spill, emergency response action, complaint, or compliance
- 20 activity. This subdivision does not prohibit the use of a flashing,
- 21 rotating, or oscillating green light by a fire service.
- 22 (f) A vehicle to perform public utility service, a vehicle
- 23 owned or leased by and licensed as a business for use in the
- 24 collection and hauling of refuse, an automobile service car or
- 25 wrecker, a vehicle of a peace officer, a vehicle operated by a
- 26 rural letter carrier or a person under contract to deliver
- 27 newspapers or other publications by motor route, a vehicle utilized

- 1 for snow or ice removal under section 682c, a private security
- 2 guard vehicle as authorized in subsection (7), a motor vehicle
- 3 while engaged in escorting or transporting an oversize load that
- 4 has been issued a permit by the state transportation department or
- 5 a local authority with respect to highways under its jurisdiction,
- 6 a vehicle owned by the National Guard or a United States military
- 7 vehicle while traveling under the appropriate recognized military
- 8 authority, a motor vehicle while towing an implement of husbandry,
- 9 or an implement of husbandry may be equipped with flashing,
- 10 rotating, or oscillating amber lights. However, a wrecker may be
- 11 equipped with flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights that
- 12 shall be activated only when the wrecker is engaged in removing or
- 13 assisting a vehicle at the scene of a traffic accident or
- 14 disablement. The flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights
- 15 shall not be activated except when the warning produced by the
- 16 lights is required for public safety. A vehicle engaged in
- 17 authorized highway repair or maintenance may be equipped with
- 18 flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber or green lights. This
- 19 subdivision does not prohibit the operator of a vehicle utilized
- 20 for snow or ice removal under section 682c that is equipped with
- 21 flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights from activating the
- 22 flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights when that vehicle
- 23 is traveling between locations at which it is being utilized for
- 24 snow or ice removal.
- 25 (g) A vehicle engaged in leading or escorting a funeral
- 26 procession or any vehicle that is part of a funeral procession may
- 27 be equipped with flashing, rotating, or oscillating purple or amber

- 1 lights that shall not be activated except during a funeral
- 2 procession.
- 3 (h) An authorized emergency vehicle may display flashing,
- 4 rotating, or oscillating white lights in conjunction with an
- 5 authorized emergency light as prescribed in this section.
- 6 (i) A private motor vehicle of a physician responding to an
- 7 emergency call may be equipped with and the physician may use
- 8 flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights mounted on the roof
- 9 section of the vehicle either as a permanent installation or by
- 10 means of magnets or suction cups and clearly visible in a 360-
- 11 degree arc from a distance of 500 feet when in use. The physician
- 12 shall first obtain written authorization from the county sheriff.
- 13 (j) A public transit vehicle may be equipped with a flashing,
- 14 oscillating, or rotating light mounted on the roof of the vehicle
- 15 approximately 6 feet from the rear of the vehicle that displays a
- 16 white light to the front, side, and rear of the vehicle, which
- 17 light may be actuated by the driver for use only in inclement
- 18 weather such as fog, rain, or snow, when boarding or discharging
- 19 passengers, from 1/2 hour before sunset until 1/2 hour after
- 20 sunrise, or when conditions hinder the visibility of the public
- 21 transit vehicle. As used in this subdivision, "public transit
- 22 vehicle" means a motor vehicle, other than a station wagon or
- 23 passenger van, with a gross vehicle weight rating of more than
- 24 10,000 pounds.
- 25 (k) A person engaged in the manufacture, sale, or repair of
- 26 flashing, rotating, or oscillating lights governed by this
- 27 subsection may possess the lights for the purpose of employment,

- 1 but shall not activate the lights upon the highway unless
- 2 authorized to do so under subsection (6).
- 3 (1) A vehicle used as part of a neighborhood watch program may
- 4 be equipped with flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights,
- 5 if the vehicle is clearly identified as a neighborhood watch
- 6 vehicle and the neighborhood watch program is working in
- 7 cooperation with local law enforcement. The lights described in
- 8 this subdivision shall not be activated when the vehicle is not
- 9 being used to perform neighborhood watch program duties.
- 10 (6) A person shall not sell, loan, or otherwise furnish a
- 11 flashing, rotating, or oscillating blue or red light designed
- 12 primarily for installation on an authorized emergency vehicle to a
- 13 person except a police officer, sheriff, deputy sheriff, authorized
- 14 physician, volunteer or paid fire fighter, volunteer ambulance
- 15 driver, licensed ambulance driver or attendant of this state, a
- 16 county or municipality within this state, a person engaged in the
- 17 business of operating an ambulance or wrecker service, or a
- 18 federally recognized nonprofit charitable organization that owns
- 19 and operates an emergency support vehicle used exclusively for
- 20 emergencies. This subsection does not prohibit an authorized
- 21 emergency vehicle, equipped with flashing, rotating, or oscillating
- 22 blue or red lights, from being operated by a person other than a
- 23 person described in this section if the person receives
- 24 authorization to operate the authorized emergency vehicle from a
- 25 police officer, sheriff, deputy sheriff, authorized physician,
- 26 volunteer or paid fire fighter, volunteer ambulance driver,
- 27 licensed ambulance driver or attendant, a person operating an

- 1 ambulance or wrecker service, or a federally recognized nonprofit
- 2 charitable organization that owns and operates an emergency support
- 3 vehicle used exclusively for emergencies, except that the
- 4 authorization shall not permit the person to operate lights as
- 5 described in subsection (5)(a), (b), (c), (i), or (j), or to
- 6 exercise the privileges described in section 603. A person who
- 7 operates an authorized emergency vehicle in violation of the terms
- 8 of an authorization is guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by
- 9 imprisonment for not more than 90 days or a fine of not more than
- 10 \$100.00, or both.
- 11 (7) A private motor vehicle of a security guard agency or
- 12 alarm company licensed under the private security business and
- 13 security alarm act, 1968 PA 330, MCL 338.1051 to 338.1092, may
- 14 display flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights. The
- 15 flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights shall not be
- 16 activated on a public highway when a vehicle is in motion.
- 17 (8) This section does not prohibit, restrict, or limit the use
- 18 of lights authorized or required under sections 697, 697a, and
- **19** 698a.
- 20 (9) A person who operates a vehicle in violation of subsection
- (1), (2), (3), or (4) is responsible for a civil infraction.
- 22 Enacting section 1. This amendatory act takes effect 90 days
- 23 after the date it is enacted into law.
