(3) By August 1 of the current fiscal year, the resiliency 13 14 center for families and children shall report to the house and 15 senate appropriations subcommittees on the department budget, the 16 house and senate fiscal agencies, the house and senate policy 17 offices, and the state budget office on the status of the development of the resiliency center funded under this section and 18 on the information required in subsection (2). 19

20 (4) The unexpended portion of funds appropriated in part 1 for 21 unified clinics resiliency center for families and children is designated as a work project appropriation. Qualified program providers must start 21 providing programming by June 1. (5) The department shall reimburse qualified program providers 22 23 for each month of satisfactory monthly progress as described in section 23a of the state school aid act of 1979, 1979 PA 94, MCL 24 25 388.1623a, at a rate of \$500.00 per month. A payment shall be made to a qualified program provider for the completion of the following 26 27 by a pupil:

8 enhancement grants, \$250,000.00 shall be awarded to a land bank
9 located in a county with a population of between 136,100 and
10 136,200 according to the most recent federal decennial census for
11 building demolition.

12 (57) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for Michigan 13 enhancement grants, \$1,000,000.00 shall be awarded to a public 14 museum in a county with a population between 400,000 and 450,000 15 and in a city with a population over 100,000 according to the most 16 recent federal decennial census.

17 (58) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for Michigan 18 enhancement grants, \$1,000,000.00 shall be awarded to an 19 independent biomedical research and science education organization 20 in a county with a population between 600,000 and 610,000 and in a 21 city with a population over 185,000 according to the most recent 22 federal decennial census to be used for matching federal funds, 23 private and nonprofit grants, and private contributions.

(59) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for Michigan
enhancement grants, \$250,000.00 shall be awarded to the Conductive

Sec. 560. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for
Michigan enhancement grants, the Michigan strategic fund shall
execute a grant agreement with each recipient, pursuant to



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subsection (2). All grant funds are considered to be direct
 appropriations and, subject to receipt of all information under
 subsections (2) and (3), shall be disbursed by the Michigan
 strategic fund, as determined by the grant agreement. An initial
