EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

19 Sec. 3. (1) "Academy membership count day" means each of the 20 following days or; if the public school academy is not scheduled to be 21 in session on 1 of these days, the next succeeding day in the school 22 fiscal year on which the public school academy is scheduled to be in 23 session:

- 24 (a) The first Friday in October.
- 25 (b) The first Friday in December:
- 26 (c) The second Friday in February.
- 27 -----(d) The third Friday in April.

(2) (1) "Average daily attendance", for the purposes of complying
 with section 1471 of subpart 5 of part 5 of chapter 1 of title I of the
 elementary and secondary education act, public law 89-10, 20 U.S.C.

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2891, means 92% of the membership as defined in section 6(4).

(3) (2) "Board" means the governing body of a district or public
 school academy.

(4) (3) "Cooperative education program" means a WRITTEN voluntary
agreement between and among districts to provide certain educational
programs for pupils in certain groups of districts. THE EDUCATIONAL
PROGRAMS TO BE PROVIDED AND THE ESTIMATED NUMBER OF PUPILS FROM EACH
DISTRICT WHO WILL PARTICIPATE IN THE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS SHALL BE
SPECIFIED IN THE WRITTEN AGREEMENT, WHICH SHALL BE APPROVED BY ALL
AFFECTED DISTRICTS ANNUALLY.

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(5) (4) "Department" means the department of education.

12 (6) (5) "District" means a local school district established under 13 part 2, 3, 4, 5, or 6 of the school code of 1976, a local act school 14 district, or, except in sections 6(4), 6(6), 6(7), 13, 20, 23d, 31a, 15 163(1)(c), and 163(1)(d), an alternative public school operated under 16 section 23d or a public school academy. For 1994-95 only, district also 17 includes an instructional program operated by a public university under 18 section 23 that complies with the requirements of section 23.

19 (6) EXCEPT AS OTHERWISE SPECIFIED IN THIS SUBSECTION, "DISTRICT OF
 20 RESIDENCE" MEANS THE DISTRICT IN WHICH A PUPIL'S CUSTODIAL PARENT OR

(A) FOR PUPILS IN MEMBERSHIP IN A PUBLIC SCHOOL ACADEMY, THE
 DISTRICT OF RESIDENCE SHALL BE THE DISTRICT IN WHICH THE PUBLIC SCHOOL
 ACADEMY IS LOCATED.

(B) FOR PUPILS UNDER COURT JURISDICTION WHO ARE PLACED OUTSIDE THE
 DISTRICT IN WHICH THE PUPIL'S PARENTS OR LEGAL GUARDIAN RESIDE, THE
 DISTRICT OF RESIDENCE SHALL BE THE DISTRICT PROVIDING EDUCATIONAL
 SERVICES.

29 (C) FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION PUPILS BEING EDUCATED BY THE INTERMEDIATE
 30 SCHOOL DISTRICT, THE DISTRICT OF RESIDENCE SHALL BE THE INTERMEDIATE

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SCHOOL DISTRICT.

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(D) FOR PUPILS PLACED BY A COURT OR STATE AGENCY IN AN ON-GROUNDS PROGRAM OF A JUVENILE DETENTION FACILITY, A CHILD CARING INSTITUTION, OR A MENTAL HEALTH INSTITUTION, THE DISTRICT OF RESIDENCE SHALL BE THE DISTRICT OR INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT APPROVED BY THE DEPARTMENT TO OPERATE THE PROGRAM.

(7) "District superintendent" means the superintendent of a district, or the chief administrator of a public school academy, or the chief administrator of an instructional program operated under section 23.

Sec. 4. (1) "Elementary pupil" means a pupil in membership in grades K to 8 in a district not maintaining classes above the eighth grade or in grades K to 6 in a district maintaining classes above the eighth grade.

(2) "Extended school year" means an educational program conducted
 by a district in which pupils must be enrolled but not necessarily in
 attendance on the pupil membership count day in an extended year
 program.

The mandatory days of student instruction and prescribed clock hours shall be completed by each pupil not more than 365 calendar days after the pupil's first day of classes for the school year prescribed. The department shall prescribe pupil, personnel, and other reporting requirements for the educational program.

(3) "Fiscal year" means the state fiscal year which commences
 October 1 and continues through September 30.

(4) "General educational development testing preparation program"
 means a program that has high school level courses in writing skills,
 social studies, science, reading skills, and mathematics and that
 prepares a person to SUCCESSFULLY complete successfully the general
 educational development (GED) test.

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(5) "High school pupil" means a pupil in membership in grades 7 to
 12, except in a district not maintaining grades above the eighth grade.

3 Sec. 5. (1) "Intermediate board" means the governing body of an
4 intermediate district.

5 6 (2) "Intermediate district" means an intermediate school district established under part 7 of the school code of 1976.

7 (3) "Intermediate district weighted average FOUNDATION ALLOWANCE
8 allocation" means 103% of the average gross allowance FOUNDATION
9 ALLOWANCE per membership pupil for 1993-94 under former section 21(1)
10 of the intermediate district's constituent districts, CALCULATED BY
11 AVERAGING THE FOUNDATION ALLOWANCE PER MEMBERSHIP PUPIL OF THE
12 INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT'S CONSTITUENT DISTRICTS, weighted as to
13 membership.

(4) "Intermediate superintendent" means the superintendent of an
 intermediate district.

Sec. 6. (1) "Center program" means a program operated by a district 16 or intermediate district for special education pupils from several 17 districts in programs for the autistically impaired, trainable mentally 18 impaired, severely mentally impaired, severely multiply impaired, 19 hearing impaired, physically and otherwise health impaired, and 20 21 visually impaired. Programs for emotionally impaired pupils housed in buildings that do not serve regular education pupils shall also 22 qualify. Unless otherwise approved by the department, a center program 23 either shall serve all constituent districts within an intermediate 24 district or shall serve several districts with less than 50% of the 25 pupils residing in the operating district. In addition, pupils approved 26 by the department, who formerly would have been placed in a center 27 program, placed in noncenter programs to comply with the least 28 29 restrictive environment provisions of section 612 of part B of the 30 individuals with disabilities education act, public law 91-230, 20

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U.S.C. 1412; may be counted under this section if all of the following are met:

(a) The pupil is special education eligible and receiving special education eligible and receiving special education programs or services on the pupil count date.

—— (b) The pupil is eligible as autistically impaired; trainable mentally impaired, severely mentally impaired, and severely multiply impaired.

8 (2) "District pupil retention rate" means the proportion of pupils 9 who have not dropped out of school in the immediately preceding school 10 year and is equal to 1 minus the quotient of the number of pupils 11 unaccounted for in the immediately preceding school year, as determined 12 pursuant to subsection (3), divided by the pupils of the immediately 13 preceding school year.

(3) "District pupil retention report" means a report of the number
of pupils, excluding migrant and adult, in the district for the
immediately preceding school year, adjusted for those pupils who have
transferred into the district, transferred out of the district,
transferred to alternative programs, and have graduated, to determine
the number of pupils who are unaccounted for. The number of pupils
unaccounted for shall be calculated as determined by the department.

(4) "Membership", except as otherwise provided in this act, means 21 the average number of full-time equated pupils in grades K to 12 IN THE 22 DISTRICT OF RESIDENCE actually enrolled and in regular daily attendance 23 IN A PUBLIC SCHOOL on the pupil membership count day for the current 24 school year and on the supplemental count day for the immediately 25 preceding school year, as determined by the department and calculated 26 by adding the unaudited count completed by the department not later 27 than 45 days after the pupil membership count day of the number of 28 pupils registered for attendance plus pupils received by transfer and 29 minus pupils lost as defined by rules promulgated by the state board, 30

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1 and as corrected by a subsequent department audit, plus the final 2 audited count from the supplemental count day for the immediately 3 preceding school year, and dividing that sum by 2. For 1994-95 only, 4 for a public school academy, membership means the average number of full-time equated pupils in grades K-12 actually enrolled and in 5 regular daily attendance in the public school academy on the academy 6 7 membership count days, as determined by the department and calculated 8 by averaging the unaudited count completed by the department not later 9 than 45 days after each academy membership count day for the public school academy and as corrected by a subsequent department audit. If a 10 11 pupil counted in membership in a public school academy on the December academy membership count day was previously counted in membership in a 12 13 district on the immediately preceding pupil membership count day, the 14 district's pupil membership count for that pupil membership count day 15 shall be reduced by 1/2 pupil. If a pupil counted in membership in a 16 public school academy on the April academy membership count day was 17 previously counted in membership in a district on the immediately preceding supplemental count day, the district's supplemental 18 membership count for that supplemental count day shall be reduced by 19 20 1/2 pupil. In addition, all of the following apply to determining the membership of a district, public school academy, or intermediate 21 district: FOR 1995-96 ONLY, THE SUPPLEMENTAL COUNT DAY FOR THE 22 IMMEDIATELY PRECEDING YEAR SHALL BE ADJUSTED FOR THE DEFINITION OF 23 *DISTRICT OF RESIDENCE* IN SEC. 3(6) FOR THE PURPOSES OF CALCULATING 24 THE MEMBERSHIP OF A DISTRICT AND INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT FOR 1995-96. 25

(A) FOR A PUBLIC SCHOOL ACADEMY, MEMBERSHIP MEANS THE AVERAGE
 NUMBER OF FULL-TIME EQUATED PUPILS IN GRADES K TO 12 ACTUALLY ENROLLED
 AND IN REGULAR DAILY ATTENDANCE ON THE PUPIL MEMBERSHIP COUNT DAY FOR
 THE CURRENT SCHOOL YEAR AND ON THE SUPPLEMENTAL COUNT DAY FOR THE
 IMMEDIATELY PRECEDING SCHOOL YEAR, AS DETERMINED BY THE DEPARTMENT AND

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CALCULATED BY ADDING THE NUMBER OF PUPILS REGISTERED FOR ATTENDANCE ON THE PUPIL MEMBERSHIP COUNT DAY PLUS PUPILS RECEIVED BY TRANSFER AND MINUS PUPILS LOST AS DEFINED BY RULES PROMULGATED BY THE STATE BOARD, AND AS CORRECTED BY A SUBSEQUENT DEPARTMENT AUDIT, PLUS THE FINAL AUDITED COUNT FROM THE SUPPLEMENTAL COUNT DAY FOR THE IMMEDIATELY PRECEDING SCHOOL YEAR, AND DIVIDING THAT SUM BY 2. A PUPIL COUNTED IN A PUBLIC SCHOOL ACADEMY ON THE PUPIL MEMBERSHIP COUNT DAY OR THE SUPPLEMENTAL COUNT DAY MAY NOT BE COUNTED IN A DISTRICT OR INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT ON THE SAME COUNT DAY.

(i) FOR A NEW PUBLIC SCHOOL ACADEMY BEGINNING OPERATIONS IN 1995-96 BY THE PUPIL MEMBERSHIP COUNT DAY, MEMBERSHIP MEANS THE AVERAGE NUMBER OF FULL-TIME EQUATED PUPILS IN GRADES K TO 12 ACTUALLY ENROLLED AND IN REGULAR DAILY ATTENDANCE ON THE PUPIL MEMBERSHIP COUNT DAY FOR THE CURRENT SCHOOL YEAR AND ON THE SUPPLEMENTAL COUNT DAY FOR THE CURRENT SCHOOL YEAR, AS DETERMINED BY THE DEPARTMENT AND CALCULATED BY ADDING THE NUMBER OF PUPILS REGISTERED FOR ATTENDANCE ON THE PUPIL MEMBERSHIP COUNT DAY PLUS PUPILS RECEIVED BY TRANSFER AND MINUS PUPILS LOST AS DEFINED BY RULES PROMULGATED BY THE STATE BOARD, AND AS CORRECTED BY A SUBSEQUENT DEPARTMENT AUDIT, PLUS THE FINAL AUDITED COUNT FROM THE SUPPLEMENTAL COUNT DAY FOR THE CURRENT SCHOOL YEAR, AND DIVIDING THAT SUM BY 2.

(ii) FOR A NEW PUBLIC SCHOOL ACADEMY BEGINNING OPERATIONS IN 1995-96 AFTER THE PUPIL MEMBERSHIP COUNT DAY AND BY THE SUPPLEMENTAL COUNT DAY, MEMBERSHIP MEANS THE FINAL AUDITED COUNT OF THE NUMBER OF FULL-TIME EQUATED PUPILS IN GRADES K TO 12 ACTUALLY ENROLLED AND IN REGULAR DAILY ATTENDANCE ON THE SUPPLEMENTAL COUNT DAY FOR THE CURRENT SCHOOL YEAR.

(iii) FOR A PUBLIC SCHOOL ACADEMY THAT RECEIVED FUNDS UNDER FORMER SECTION 23 OR RECEIVED FUNDS FROM AN INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT PURSUANT TO FORMER SECTION 23D IN 1994-95, MEMBERSHIP MEANS THE AVERAGE NUMBER OF

1 FULL-TIME EQUATED PUPILS IN GRADES K TO 12 ACTUALLY ENROLLED AND IN 2 REGULAR DATLY ATTENDANCE ON THE PUPIL MEMBERSHIP COUNT DAY FOR THE CURRENT SCHOOL YEAR AND THE MEMBERSHIP COUNT USED TO CALCULATE PAYMENTS 3 UNDER FORMER SECTION 23 AND FORMER SECTION 23D IN 1994-95, AS 4 DETERMINED BY THE DEPARTMENT AND CALCULATED BY ADDING THE NUMBER OF 5 б PUPILS REGISTERED FOR ATTENDANCE ON THE PUPIL MEMBERSHIP COUNT DAY PLUS 7 PUPILS RECEIVED BY TRANSFER AND MINUS PUPILS LOST AS DEFINED BY RULES PROMULGATED BY THE STATE BOARD, AND AS CORRECTED BY A SUBSEQUENT 8 DEPARTMENT AUDIT, PLUS THE MEMBERSHIP COUNT USED TO CALCULATE PAYMENTS 9 UNDER FORMER SECTION 23 AND FORMER SECTION 23D IN 1994-95, AND DIVIDING 10 11 THAT SUM BY 2.

(a) (B) In a district, PUBLIC SCHOOL ACADEMY, OR INTERMEDIATE
 DISTRICT operating an extended school year program approved by the
 state board, a pupil enrolled, but not scheduled to be in regular daily
 attendance on a pupil membership count day, shall be counted.

16 (b) (C) Pupils to be counted in membership IN A DISTRICT, PUBLIC SCHOOL ACADEMY, OR INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT shall be not less than 5 years 17 of age on December 1 and less than 20 years of age on September 1 of 18 19 the school year except a special education pupil who is enrolled and 20 receiving instruction in a special education program approved by the 21 department and not having a high school diploma who is less than 26 22 years of age as of September 1 of the current school year shall be counted in membership. 23

(c) (D) An individual who has obtained a high school diploma shall
 not be counted in membership IN A DISTRICT, PUBLIC SCHOOL ACADEMY, OR
 INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT. An individual who has obtained a general
 education development (G.E.D.) certificate shall not be counted in
 membership. AN INDIVIDUAL PARTICIPATING IN A JOB TRAINING PROGRAM
 FUNDED UNDER FORMER SECTION 107A OR A JOBS PROGRAM FUNDED UNDER FORMER
 SECTION 107B, BOTH ADMINISTERED BY THE MICHIGAN JOBS COMMISSION, OR ANY

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SUCCESSOR OF EITHER OF THOSE 2 PROGRAMS, SHALL NOT BE COUNTED IN MEMBERSHIP.

(d) (E) The department shall give a uniform interpretation of full-time and part-time memberships, including an interpretation of full-time membership for kindergarten pupils for 1994-95. BEGINNING IN 1995-96, FULL-TIME EQUATED MEMBERSHIPS FOR PUPILS IN KINDERGARTEN SHALL BE DETERMINED BY DIVIDING THE NUMBER OF CLASS HOURS SCHEDULED AND PROVIDED PER YEAR PER KINDERGARTEN PUPIL BY A NUMBER EQUAL TO 1/2 THE NUMBER OF CLASS HOURS USED FOR DETERMINING FULL-TIME EQUATED MEMBERSHIPS FOR PUPILS IN GRADES 1 TO 12.

(e) An intermediate district that operates a program under section 86 may count in its membership the number of full-time-equated pupils who are enrolled and in regular daily attendance in the program under section 86 on the pupil membership count day in the current school year. A pupil counted in membership in an intermediate district under this subdivision shall not be counted in membership in a district.

(f) For the purposes of this subsection, full-time equated memberships for pupils IN A DISTRICT, PUBLIC SCHOOL ACADEMY, OR INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT in grades 1 to 12 shall be determined by dividing the number of class hours scheduled and provided per year per pupil by 900 for 1994-95, 990 for 1995-96 and 1996-97, 1,035 for 1997-98 and 1998-99, and 1,080 for 1999-2000 and succeeding fiscal years. In determining full-time equated memberships for pupils who are dually enrolled in a postsecondary institution under section 21b, a pupil shall not be considered to be less than a full-time equated pupil solely because of the effect of his or her dual enrollment on the number of class hours provided by the district to the pupil. Beginning in 1995-96, full-time equated memberships for pupils in kindergarten shall be determined by dividing the number of class hours scheduled and provided per year per kindergarten pupil by a number equal to 1/2 the

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number used for determining full-time equated memberships for papils in
 grades 1 to 12.

3 (g) For a district that has qualified currently migrant pupils enrolled in the district as of the pupil membership count day who were 4 5 not counted in membership in the district on the supplemental count day 6 for the immediately preceding school year, as determined by the 7 department using the criteria used for eligibility for the migrant 8 education program under the Hawkins-Stafford elementary and secondary 9 school improvement amendments of 1988, Public Law 100-297, the number 10 of those pupils counted in the district's membership is 3/4 of the 11 number of those pupils counted on the pupil membership count day only.

12 (h) A pupil enrolled in a vocational education program supported by 13 a millage levied over an area larger than a single district or in an 14 area vocational-technical education program established pursuant to 15 section 690 of the school code of 1976; being section 380.690 of the 16 Michigan Compiled Laws, shall be counted only in the pupil's district 17 of residence.

(i) For 1994-95 only, if a district has individuals at least age 16 18 19 as of December 1 and less than age 20 as of September 1 of the school 20 year who are enrolled in the district in a department-approved 21 alternative education program and who were not counted in membership in 22 a district on the 1994 supplemental count day, the number of those 23 individuals counted in the district's membership is the number of those 24 individuals counted as pupils on the district's 1994 pupil membership 25 count day only.

26 (j) For 1994-95 only; the membership of an instructional program 27 operated by a public university under section 23 that is funded under 28 this act as a district shall be considered to be the average number of 29 full-time equated pupils in grades K to 12 actually enrolled and in 30 regular daily attendance in the instructional program on the pupil

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membership count day for the 1993-94 school year, adjusted by subtracting 16 membership pupils, and on the supplemental count day in the 1993-94 school year, as determined by the department and calculated by adding the final audited counts for those 2 count days, with the count for the 1993-94 pupil membership count day adjusted as provided in this subdivision, and dividing that sum by 2.

(k) For 1994-95 only; if there are individuals enrolled in an intermediate district in a special education program that is not a center program and those individuals were deducted from the intermediate district's count for the 1994 supplemental count day because of residency in a district that did not receive an allocation under section 21(1) in 1993-94, the number of those individuals counted in the intermediate district's membership is the number of those individuals counted as pupils on the 1994 pupil membership count day only.

(5) "Public school academy" means a public school academy operating under part 6a or 6b of the school code of 1976.

(6) "Pupil" means a person in membership in a public school. A district must have the approval of the pupil's district of residence to count the pupil in membership, except approval by the pupil's district of residence shall not be required for nonpublic part-time pupils. , for pupils receiving 1/2 or less of their instruction in a district other than their district of residence; for pupils enrolled in a school operated under section 23 or 23d, or for those pupils who were enrolled and in regular daily attendance and remain enrolled and in regular daily attendance and remain enrolled and in regular daily attendance and remain their district of residence before April 1, 1981.

(7) "Pupil membership count day" of a district or intermediate district means:

(9) "The school code of 1976" means Act No. 451 of the Public Acts
of 1976, as amended, being sections 380.1 to 380.1852 of the Michigan
Compiled Laws.

(10) "School fiscal year" means a fiscal year which commences July
14 1 and continues through June 30.

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(11) "State board" means the state board of education.

(12) "Supplemental count day" means the day on which the
 supplemental pupil count is conducted under section 6a.

(13) "Tuition pupil" means a pupil of school age attending school 18 19 in a district other than the pupil's district of residence. Tuition 20 pupil does not include a pupil who is a special education pupil.7 a 21 pupil served by a cooperative education program; a pupil served by a 22 vocational education program supported by a millage levied over an area 23 larger than a single school district or by an area vocational-technica 24 education program established pursuant to section 690 of the school 25 code of 1976; or a pupil served by an intermediate district schools of 26 choice pilot program as described in former section 91. (15) (16) "Total state aid" or "total state school aid" means the total combined amount of all funds due to a district, intermediate district, or other entity under all of the provisions of this act.

15 (b) For a district that in the immediately preceding state fiscal 16 year had a foundation allowance of less than the sum of \$6,500.00 plus the total dollar amount of all adjustments made since 1994-95 in the 17 basic foundation allowance pursuant to the index under subsection (2), 18 19 and that qualified for a supplemental allowance described in subsection 20 (4) in the immediately preceding state fiscal year, the district shall receive a foundation allowance in an amount equal to the sum of the 21 district's foundation allowance for the immediately preceding state 22 fiscal year plus the dollar amount of the adjustment from the 23 24 immediately preceding state fiscal year to the current state fiscal 25 year made in the basic foundation allowance pursuant to the index under subsection (2). 26

27 (c) (B) For a district that had combined state and local revenue 28 per membership pupil in the 1994-95 state fiscal year of $\frac{6,500:00}{0}$ or 29 more AT LEAST THE BASIC FOUNDATION ALLOWANCE, the district shall 30 receive a foundation allowance in an amount equal to the sum of the

For a 29 district that has a millage reduction required under section 31 of 30

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article IX of the state constitution of 1963, the state portion of the 1 district's foundation allowance shall be calculated as if that 2 reduction did not occur. FOR 1995-96 AND EACH SUCCEEDING FISCAL YEAR, 3 THE \$6,500.00 AMOUNT PRESCRIBED IN THIS SUBSECTION SHALL BE ADJUSTED BY 4 5 AN AMOUNT EQUAL TO THE DOLLAR AMOUNT OF THE ADJUSTMENT FROM THE IMMEDIATELY PRECEDING STATE FISCAL YEAR TO THE CURRENT STATE FISCAL 6 7 YEAR IN THE BASIC FOUNDATION ALLOWANCE PURSUANT TO THE INDEX UNDER SUBSECTION (2). 8

4 ----- (d) The district identifies in its application all of the 5 following:

6 (i) The estimated total number of children in the community who 7 meet the criteria of section 36.

8 (*ii*) The estimated number of children in the community who meet the 9 criteria of section 36 and are being served by other early childhood 10 development programs operating in the community.

11 (*iii*) The estimated number of children who meet the criteria of 12 section 36 who will remain unserved after the district and community 13 early childhood programs have met their funded enrollments. The school 14 district shall maintain a waiting list of identified unserved eligible 15 children who would be served when openings are available:

16 -----(iv) All collaborative activities between the district and other
 17 operators of early childhood development programs.

(e) (D) The district has submitted for approval a program budget 18 19 that includes only those costs not reimbursed or reimbursable by federal funding, that are clearly and directly attributable to the 20 early childhood readiness program, and that would not be incurred if 21 the program were not being offered. (*ii*) Review all referrals for THE MECHANISMS AND CRITERIA USED TO
 DETERMINE participation in the early childhood program and recommend
 children for placement.

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(*iii*) Review the health screening program for all participants.

(v) Review the mechanisms in place for the referral of families to

(vii) Review, evaluate, and make recommendations TO GRANT

(g) (F) The district has submitted for departmental approval a plan

(7) FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH THE REPORTING REQUIREMENTS OF SUBSECTION(6) WILL RESULT IN THE WITHHOLDING OF THE JUNE 30 PAYMENT AMOUNT TO THE MATHEMATICS AND SCIENCE CENTER.

7 (8) IN ORDER TO RECEIVE FUNDS UNDER THIS SECTION, A GRANT RECIPIENT
8 SHALL ALLOW ACCESS FOR THE DEPARTMENT OR THE DEPARTMENT'S DESIGNEE TO
9 AUDIT ALL RECORDS RELATED TO THE PROGRAM FOR WHICH IT RECEIVES SUCH
10 FUNDS. THE GRANT RECIPIENT SHALL REIMBURSE THE STATE FOR ALL
11 DISALLOWANCES FOUND IN THE AUDIT.

Sec. 101. (1) NOTWITHSTANDING ANY ADMINISTRATIVE RULE, to be 12 eligible to receive state aid under this act, not later than the fourth 13 SECOND Friday after the pupil membership count day and not later than 14the fourth SECOND Friday after the supplemental count day, each 15 district superintendent through the secretary of the district's board 16 shall file with the intermediate superintendent a certified and sworn 17 copy of the district's enrollment for the current school year as of the 18 pupil membership count day and as of the supplemental count day, as 19 applicable. In addition, a district maintaining school during the 20 entire year, as provided under section 1561 of the school code of 1976, 21 being section 380.1561 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, shall file with 2.2 23 the intermediate superintendent a certified and sworn copy of the enrollment for the current school year pursuant to rules promulgated by 24 the state board. Not later than 20 calendar days after the fifth Friday 25 after the pupil membership count day and not later than 20 calendar 26 27 days after the fifth Friday after the supplemental count day, the intermediate district shall transmit to the department the data filed 28 by each of its constituent districts. If a district fails to file the 29 30 sworn and certified copy as required under this subsection or if an 03993'95

intermediate district fails to transmit the data in its possession as 1 required under this subsection. TO THE INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT IN A 2 3 TIMELY MANNER, THE INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT SHALL NOTIFY THE DEPARTMENT AND state aid due to be distributed under this act shall be withheld 4 from the defaulting district or intermediate district IMMEDIATELY 5 б beginning with the next payment after the failure and continuing with 7 each payment until the district or intermediate district complies with this subsection. IF AN INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT FAILS TO TRANSMIT THE DATA 3 9 IN ITS POSSESSION IN A TIMELY AND ACCURATE MANNER TO THE DEPARTMENT, 10 STATE AID DUE TO BE DISTRIBUTED UNDER THIS ACT SHALL BE WITHHELD FROM THE DEFAULTING INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT, IMMEDIATELY BEGINNING WITH THE 11 NEXT PAYMENT AFTER THE FAILURE AND CONTINUING WITH EACH PAYMENT UNTIL 12 13 THE INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT COMPLIES WITH THIS SUBSECTION. If a district 14 or intermediate district does not comply with this subsection by the end of the fiscal year, the district or intermediate district forfeits 15 16 the amount withheld. A person who willfully falsifies a figure or 17 statement in the certified and sworn copy of enrollment shall be punished in the manner prescribed by the laws of this state SECTION 161 18 19 OF THIS ACT.

20 (2) Each district shall provide a minimum of 180 days and the required minimum number of hours of pupil instruction. The required 21 minimum number of hours of pupil instruction is as follows: in 1994-95, 22 23 each district shall provide a minimum of 900 hours of pupil instruction; in 1995-96 and 1996-97, each district shall provide a 24 25 minimum of 990 hours of pupil instruction; in 1997-98 and 1998-99, each district shall provide a minimum of 1,035 hours of pupil instruction; 26 and, beginning in 1999-2000, each district shall provide a minimum of 27 1,080 hours of pupil instruction. Except as otherwise provided in this 28 29 section, a district failing to hold 180 days of pupil instruction shall forfeit 1/180 of its total state aid appropriation for each day of 30

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failure. Except as otherwise provided in this section, a district 1 failing to comply with the required minimum hours of pupil instruction 2 3 shall forfeit from its total state aid allocation an amount determined by applying a ratio of the time duration the district was in 4 noncompliance in relation to the required minimum number of hours. A 5 6 district failing to meet both the minimum 180 days of pupil instruction 7 requirement and the minimum number of hours requirement of pupil instruction requirement shall be penalized only the higher of the 2 8 amounts calculated under the forfeiture provisions of this subsection. 9 Not later than August 1, the board of each district shall certify to 10 the department the number of days and hours of pupil instruction in the 11 previous school year. If the district did not hold at least 180 days 12 13 and the required minimum number of hours of pupil instruction, the deduction of state aid shall be made in the following fiscal year from 14 the first payment of state school aid. A district is not subject to 15 forfeiture of funds under this subsection for a fiscal year in which a 16 forfeiture was already imposed under subsection (7). Days lost because 17 of strikes or teachers' conferences shall not be counted as days of 18 19 pupil instruction. A district not having 75% of the district's 20 membership in attendance on any day shall receive state aid in that proportion of 1/180 that the actual percent of attendance bears to the 21 specified percentage. The state board shall promulgate rules for the 22 implementation of this subsection. 23

(3) The first 2 days for which pupil instruction is not provided
because of conditions not within the control of school authorities,
such as severe storms, fires, epidemics, or health conditions as
defined by the city, county, or state health authorities, shall be
counted as days of pupil instruction. Subsequent such days shall not be
counted as days of pupil instruction.

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(4) A district shall not be allotted or paid a sum under this act

in a fiscal year if the department determines that at the end of the preceding school fiscal year the amount of funds on hand in the district available for the payment of the operation cost in the district exceeded the amount of money expended for operation cost in the district during the preceding school fiscal year.

(5) A district shall not forfeit part of its state aid
appropriation if it adopts or has in existence an alternative
scheduling program for pupils in kindergarten, which program is
approved by the state board.

(6) Upon application by the district for a particular fiscal year, 10 11 the state board may waive the 180-day requirement of subsection (2) for 12 a district if the district has adopted an experimental school year 13 schedule in 1 or more buildings in the district if the experimental 14 school year schedule provides the required minimum number or more hours 15 of pupil instruction and is consistent with all state board policies on 16 school improvement and restructuring. If a district applies for and 17 receives a waiver under this subsection and complies with the terms of 18 the waiver, for the fiscal year covered by the waiver the district is 19 not subject to forfeiture under this section of part of its state aid 20 allocation for the specific building or program covered by the waiver.

21 (7) Not later than January 31 of each fiscal year, the board of 22 each district shall certify to the department the planned number of 23 days and hours of pupil instruction in the district for the school year ending in the fiscal year. In addition to any other penalty or 24 25 forfeiture under this section, if at any time the department determines 26 that 1 or more of the following has occurred in a district, the district shall forfeit in the current fiscal year beginning in the next 27 28 payment to be calculated by the department a proportion of the funds 29 due to the district under this act that is equal to the proportion below 180 days and the required minimum number of hours, as specified 30

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in the following:

(a) The district fails to operate its schools for a minimum of 180
days and the required minimum number of hours of pupil instruction in a
school year, including days counted under subsection (3).

5 (b) The board of the district takes formal action not to operate 6 its schools for a minimum of 180 days and the required minimum number 7 of hours of pupil instruction in a school year, including days counted 8 under subsection (3).

(8) Upon application by the district for a particular fiscal year, 9 the state board may waive for a district the 180-day requirement of 10 subsection (2) for a department-approved alternative education program 11 operated through an adult education program. If a district applies for 12 and receives a waiver under this subsection and complies with the terms 13 of the waiver, for the fiscal year covered by the waiver the district 14is not subject to forfeiture under this section for the specific 15 program covered by the waiver. 16

Sec. 102. (1) A district OR INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT receiving money 17 under this act shall not adopt or operate under a deficit budget, and a 18 district OR INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT shall not incur an operating deficit 19 20 in a fund during a school fiscal year. A district OR INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT having an existing deficit or which incurs a deficit shall not 21 be allotted or paid a further sum under this act until the district OR 22 INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT submits to the department for approval a budget 23 24 for the current school fiscal year and a plan to eliminate the district's OR INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT'S deficit not later than the end of 25 the second school fiscal year after the deficit was incurred. Withheld 26 state aid payments shall be released after the department approves the 27 deficit reduction plan and ensures that the budget for the current 28 school fiscal year is balanced. 29

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(2) Not later than December 1 of each year, the department shall 1 prepare a report of deficits incurred by districts AND INTERMEDIATE 2 3 DISTRICTS in the immediately preceding fiscal year and the progress made in reducing those deficits and submit the report to the standing 4 5 committees of the legislature responsible for K-12 education legislation, the appropriations subcommittees of the legislature 6 7 responsible for K-12 education appropriations, the house and senate fiscal agencies, the state treasurer, and the department of management 8 9 and budget. The department shall also submit interim reports concerning 10 district AND INTERMEDIATE DISTRICTS deficits as necessary.

11 (3) The amount of the permissible deficit for each school fiscal 12 year shall not exceed the amount of state aid reduced by an executive 13 order during that school fiscal year.

(4) A district OR INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT with an existing deficit or
 which incurs a deficit shall submit a monthly expenditure MONITORING
 report ON REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES IN A FORM AND MANNER PRESCRIBED BY
 to the department.

(5) If a district is not able to comply with the provisions of this 18 section, a district OR INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT shall submit to the 19 department a plan to eliminate its deficit. Upon approval of the plan 20 submitted, the superintendent of public instruction may continue 21 allotment and payment of funds under this act, extend the period of 22 23 time in which a district OR INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT has to eliminate its deficit, and set special conditions that the district OR INTERMEDIATE 24 DISTRICT must meet during the period of the extension. 25

(6) For the purposes of this section, a district OR INTERMEDIATE
 DISTRICT is considered to have incurred an operating deficit if the
 district incurs any withholding of or financial penalty, other than a
 temporary delay, against any portion of its total state school aid
 allocation under this act.

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Sec. 104a. (1) In order to receive state aid under this act in 1993-94, 1994-95, or 1995-96, a district shall comply with this section and shall award a state-endorsed high school diploma to an eligible graduate as provided in this section. For a pupil scheduled to graduate in 1994, 1995, or 1996 to be eligible for a state-endorsement in 1 or more of the subject areas of communication arts, mathematics, or science, the pupil must achieve at least 1 of the following:

8 (a) A passing score on locally-adopted and state-approved basic 9 proficiency tests measuring proficiency in 1 or more of the subject 10 areas specified in this subsection.

(b) If the pupil is eligible to take the general education
 development (G.E.D.) test, a passing score in 1 or more of the subject
 areas specified in this subsection and tested in the G.E.D. test.

(c) For a state endorsement in communications arts, at least 14 category 2 on the A SCORE OF SATISFACTORY ON EITHER THE STORY OR 15 INFORMATIONAL reading portion of the Michigan educational assessment 16 program (MEAP) grade 10 test; for a state endorsement in mathematics, 17 at least 50% of the objectives A SCORE OF MODERATE on the mathematics 18 portion of the MEAP grade 10 test; and, for a state endorsement in 19 science, at least 50% of the objectives on the science portion of the 20 MEAP grade 11 test. 21

(2) Beginning with pupils scheduled to graduate in 1997, if a pupil 22 23 achieves the outcomes required by the state board, as measured by an assessment instrument developed under subsection (8), for a 24 25 state-endorsed high school diploma in 1 or more of the subject areas of 26 communications skills, mathematics, and science, the pupil's district shall award a state endorsement on the pupil's diploma in each of the 27 subject areas in which the pupil demonstrated the required proficiency. 28 29 A district shall not award a state endorsement to a pupil unless the

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pupil meets the applicable requirements for the endorsement, as described in this subsection. A school district may award a high school diploma to a pupil who successfully completes local district requirements established in accordance with state law for high school graduation, regardless of whether the pupil is eligible for any state endorsement.

7 (3) A district that offers a pupil the opportunity to pass a basic 8 proficiency test described in subsection (1)(a) as 1 means to obtain a 9 state-endorsed diploma in 1994, 1995, or 1996 may submit the district's 10 own basic proficiency test to the department for approval to be used by 11 the district to assess proficiency.

(4) A pupil who does not achieve at least 1 of the requirements 12 listed in subsection (1) or the requirements of subsection (2), as 13 applicable, may be reevaluated each school year until the pupil 14 achieves an applicable requirement for a state-endorsed diploma. In 15 addition, the board of the district in which the pupil is enrolled 16 shall provide that there be at least 1 meeting attended by at least the 17 pupil and a member of the district's staff or a local or intermediate 18 district consultant who is proficient in the measurement and evaluation 19 of pupils. The district may provide the meeting as a group meeting for 20 21 pupils in similar circumstances. If the pupil is a minor, the district shall invite and encourage the pupil's parent, legal guardian, or 22 person in loco parentis to attend the meeting and shall mail a notice 23 of the meeting to the pupil's parent, legal guardian, or person in loco 24 parentis. The purpose of this meeting and any subsequent meeting under 25 26 this subsection shall be to determine an educational program for the pupil designed to have the pupil reach proficiency in each subject or 27 skill area in which he or she was assessed by the testing as not 28 proficient. In addition, a district may provide for subsequent meetings 29 with the pupil conducted by a high school counselor or teacher 30

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designated by the pupil's high school principal, and shall invite and encourage the pupil's parent, legal guardian, or person in loco parentis to attend the subsequent meetings. The board may provide special programs for the pupil or may develop a program using the educational programs regularly provided by the district. A pupil may be reevaluated at any time the district administers an applicable assessment instrument.

(5) For a state-endorsed diploma, a pupil must achieve at least 1 8 of the requirements listed in subsection (1) or the requirements of 9 subsection (2), as applicable, in addition to any other requirements 10 established by law or by the board of a district for a high school 11 diploma. If the board of a district determines that a pupil qualifies 12 for a state-endorsed diploma, the board shall indicate on the pupil's 13 14 high school diploma and transcript that the pupil achieved the proficiency necessary for receipt of a state-endorsed diploma. 15

16 (6) An individual may repeat any of the tests or assessment instruments specified in subsection (1) or subsection (2), as 17 18 applicable, at any time the district regularly offers the test or assessment or, for the MEAP tests described in subsection (1)(c), 19 during the month of April or first 2 weeks of May, and, upon achieving 20 at least 1 of the requirements listed in subsection (1) or the 21 22 requirements of subsection (2), as applicable, and completing all other applicable requirements for a high school diploma, shall be awarded a 23 24 state-endorsed diploma.

(7) A district shall provide accommodations to a pupil with
disabilities for the proficiency testing or assessment required under
this section, as provided under section 504 of title V of the
rehabilitation act of 1973, Public Law 93-112, 29 U.S.C. 794; subtitle
A of title II of the Americans with disabilities act of 1990, Public
Law 101-336, 42 U.S.C. 12131 to 12134; and the implementing regulations

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for those statutes. A special education pupil scheduled to graduate in 1994, 1995, or 1996 who has passed an alternative form of assessment permitted under this section as it was in effect for 1992-93 shall receive the applicable endorsement under this section.

5 (8) Not later than July 31, 1993, for the purposes of this section, 6 the state-board shall develop or select and approve assessment 7 instruments to determine pupil proficiency in communications skills, 8 mathematics, and science. The assessment instruments shall be based on 9 the state board model core curriculum outcomes.

10 (9) (8) Not later than July 31, 1995, the state board shall develop 11 or select and approve assessment instruments for the purpose of 12 awarding state endorsements of advanced mastery in specified subject 13 areas.

24 (3) APPLICATIONS SHALL BE SUBMITTED TO THE COMMISSION NOT LATER
 25 THAN A DATE TO BE DETERMINED BY THE COMMISSION. APPLICATIONS SHALL BE
 26 SUBMITTED IN A FORM AND MANNER AS PRESCRIBED BY THE COMMISSION.

6 ENROLLED IN AN ADULT EDUCATION PROGRAM.

7 (iv) A PLAN FOR PROVIDING TECHNICAL, VOCATIONAL AND JOB RELATED

A RECIPIENT OF A GRANT UNDER THIS SECTION SHALL CHARGE TUITION NOT TO EXCEED THE ACTUAL PER PUPIL COST OF THE PROGRAM TO PARTICIPANTS WHO ARE TWENTY-FIVE YEARS OF AGE OR OLDER ON SEPTEMBER 1 OF THE SCHOOL YEAR.

(9) AS USED IN THIS SECTION, "COMMISSION" MEANS THE STATE ADULT 10 EDUCATION ADVISORY COMMISSION. MEMBERSHIP OF THE COMMISSION SHALL 11 CONSIST OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION, OR A DESIGNEE; THE 12 DIRECTOR OF THE MICHIGAN JOBS COMMISSION, OR A DESIGNEE; A 13 REPRESENTATIVE OF THE BUSINESS COMMUNITY; A REPRESENTATIVE OF SCHOOL 14 DISTRICTS; A REPRESENTATIVE OF INTERMEDIATE DISTRICTS; AND A 15 REPRESENTATIVE OF PUBLIC COMMUNITY COLLEGES. THE DEPARTMENT AND 21 22 MICHIGAN JOBS COMMISSION SHALL ALLOCATE SUFFICIENT STAFF AND RESOURCES TO IMPLEMENT THIS SECTION. 23

(10) AS USED IN THIS SECTION, "PARTICIPANT" MEANS THE AVERAGE
NUMBER OF FULL-TIME-EQUATED INDIVIDUALS AGE 16 OR OLDER ENROLLED IN AND

(12) A DISTRICT, INTERMEDIATE DISTRICT, COMMUNITY COLLEGE, OR 11 12 CONSORTIUM THAT RECEIVES FUNDING FOR ADULT EDUCATION PARTICIPANTS UNDER 13 THIS SECTION SHALL ALLOW ACCESS FOR THE DEPARTMENT OR THE DEPARTMENT'S DESIGNEE TO AUDIT ALL RECORDS RELATED TO THE ADULT EDUCATION PROGRAM 14 FOR ALL ENTITIES THAT RECEIVE MONEY, EITHER DIRECTLY OR INDIRECTLY 15 THROUGH A CONTRACT, FROM THE FUNDING PROVIDED UNDER THIS SECTION. (1) Except as provided in section 113, a A district having tuition pupils enrolled on the pupil membership count day of 22 23 each year may charge the district in which the tuition pupils reside an 24 amount for tuition that does not exceed the tuition rate computed under section 1401 of the school code of 1976, being section 380.1401 of the 25 Michigan Compiled Laws. Sec. 149. (1) From the general fund/general purpose appropriation 17 in section 11, there is allocated \$5,000,000.00 \$2,500,000.00 for 18 1994-95 1995-96 for the final year of a grant to Michigan state 19 20 university for the Michigan partnership for new education. The payments shall be made in 2 equal installments on October 20 and December 20. 21 During each state fiscal year, the Michigan partnership and its partner 22 23 institutions shall raise or contribute matching funds totaling at least 1/2 of the amount allocated in this section for the partnership. 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(g) Educational improvement policy studies.

(2) The funds allocated under this section may be expended for
 purposes including, but not limited to, all of the following:

(a) Released time for teachers and administrators to collaborate on
 educational innovation with university faculty and community partners.

(b) Compensation for university faculty, teachers, and
administrators to collaborate on educational innovation activities such
as course planning, materials development, professional development,
research, and dissemination.

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(c) Compensation for staff necessary to facilitate the **participation** of teachers, administrators, university faculty, and **community partners**.

(d) Research reports, books, and other materials related to curriculum, instruction, organization, and management of schools.

(e) Evaluation of the work of the partnership, including professional development schools, community partnerships, university professional education preparation, product development, and dissemination networks.

(f) Meeting and travel expenses.

(3) Not later than March 1, 1995 DECEMBER 30, the Michigan 11 partnership for new education shall submit to the senate and house 12 appropriations subcommittees responsible for the department's budget, 13 the senate and house fiscal agencies, the governor, THE DEPARTMENT OF 14 MANAGEMENT AND BUDGET, and the state board a report on its activities 15 and accomplishments for the 1993-94 PRIOR fiscal year, including 16 evaluation results, and matching funds raised or contributed, AND 17 EXPENDITURES. Not later than October 1, 1994; the Michigan partnership 18 for new education shall submit to each of those entities a detailed 19 work plan for the 1994 95 fiscal year. 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furnish to the department on October 1 or the next business day of each year a statement of the state equalized valuation TAXABLE VALUE of each class of property of each district and fraction of a district within the county, on forms furnished by the department.

If a district 23 24 does not have a completed, waived, or provisional immunization record in accordance with section 1177 of the school code of 1976 for at least 25 26 90% of the district's entering pupils as recorded in the November 1 reports required under this subsection, the district is subject to 27 subsection (4) until the district has such an immunization record for 28 at least 90% of its pupils. 29

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(3) In-1994-95 1995-96, each district shall again report the

immunization status of each entering pupil in grades K through 12 to 1 the local health department in which it is located by February 1, 1995 2 1996, in a manner prescribed by the department of public health. Not 3 later than March 31, 1995 1996, the department of public health shall 4 notify the department by district of the percentage of entering pupils 5 who do not have a completed, waived, or provisional immunization record 6 in accordance with section 1177 of the school code of 1976. If a 7 district does not have a completed, waived, or provisional immunization 8 record in accordance with section 1177 of the school code of 1976 for 9 at least 95% of the district's entering pupils as recorded in the 10 February 1, 1995 1996 reports required under this subsection, the 11 district is subject to subsection (4) until the district has such an 12 immunization record for at least 95% of its pupils. If the department 13 of public health is not able to report to the department by March 31, 14 1995 1996, because a district fails to submit a report as required in 15 this subsection, or submits an incomplete, inaccurate, or late report, 16 the district is subject to subsection (4) until the report is 17 submitted in a complete and accurate form. 18

(4) If a district does not comply with this section, the department shall withhold 5% of the total funds due to the district under this act after the date the department of public health reports a district's noncompliance with this section to the department until the district complies with this section. If the district does not comply with this section by the end of the fiscal year, the district forfeits the total amount withheld.

HOWEVER, CONTINUATION OF FUNDING IS CONTINGENT ON THE AVAILABILITY OF 3 FUNDS AND DOCUMENTED EVIDENCE OF GRANTEE COMPLIANCE WITH STANDARDS FOR 4 5 EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT CONSISTENT WITH PROGRAMS FOR 4-YEAR-OLDS, AS APPROVED BY THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION, AND WITH ALL OPERATIONAL. 6 7 FISCAL, ADMINISTRATIVE, AND OTHER PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS. AFTER THREE YEARS OF FUNDING, A PROGRAM MAY REAPPLY FOR FUNDING, BUT WILL COMPETE 8 9 FOR AVAILABLE FUNDS WITH OTHER NEW PROJECTS AND OTHER PROJECTS ALSO COMPLETING THEIR THIRD YEAR OF FUNDING. 10

SEC. 329. SUBJECT TO THE PROVISIONS OF APPLICABLE FEDERAL LAW, IN 11 12 ORDER TO MORE FULLY INTEGRATE ALL JOB TRAINING PROGRAMS FOR THE STATE, 13 THE MICHIGAN JOBS COMMISSION SHALL BE THE LEAD AGENCY RESPONSIBLE FOR PROGRAMS FUNDED UNDER THE FEDERAL JOB TRAINING PARTNERSHIP ACT, 29 14 U.S.C. 1501 ET SEQ, AND GRANTS DISTRIBUTED UNDER THIS ACT SHALL BE 15 16 SUBJECT TO THE APPROVAL OF THE MICHIGAN JOBS COMMISSION. CHANGES IN FEDERAL LAW OR REGULATION PERMITTING, THE MICHIGAN JOBS COMMISSION 17 SHALL BE THE STATE AGENCY RESPONSIBLE FOR ADMINISTERING THIS FEDERAL 18 19 PROGRAM.

2 Section 4. This amendatory act shall take effect October 1, 1995.
