

HOUSE BILL No. 5229

October 10, 1995, Introduced by Reps. Anthony, Prusi, Tesanovich, DeHart, Curtis, Harder, Leland, DeMars, Weeks, London, Price, Pitoniak and Willard and referred to the Committee on Transportation.

A bill to amend section 698 of Act No. 300 of the Public Acts of 1949, entitled as amended "Michigan vehicle code,"

as amended by Act No. 101 of the Public Acts of 1994, being section 257.698 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Section 1. Section 698 of Act No. 300 of the Public Acts of
- 2 1949, as amended by Act No. 101 of the Public Acts of 1994, being
- 3 section 257.698 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, is amended to read
- 4 as follows:
- 5 Sec. 698. (1) A motor vehicle may be equipped with not more
- 6 than 2 side cowl or fender lamps which shall emit an amber or
- 7 white light without glare.

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- 1 (2) A motor vehicle may be equipped with not more than 1
 2 running board courtesy lamp on each side which shall emit a white
 3 or amber light without glare.
- 4 (3) Backing lights of red, amber, or white may be mounted on 5 the rear of a motor vehicle if the switch controlling the light 6 is so arranged that the light may be turned on only if the vehi-7 cle is in reverse gear. The backing lights when unlighted shall 8 be covered or otherwise arranged so as not to reflect objection-9 able glare in the eyes of a driver of a vehicle approaching from 10 the rear.
- (4) Unless both covered and unlit, a vehicle driven on the highways of this state shall not be equipped with a lamp or a part designed to be a reflector unless expressly required or per-14 mitted by this chapter or that meets the standards prescribed in 15 49 C.F.R. 571.108. A lamp or a part designed to be a reflector, if visible from the front, shall display or reflect a white or 17 amber light; if visible from either side, shall display or 18 reflect an amber or red light; and if visible from the rear, 19 shall display or reflect a red light, except as otherwise provided by law.
- 21 (5) The use or possession of flashing, oscillating, or
 22 rotating lights of any color is prohibited except as otherwise
 23 provided by law, or under the following circumstances:
- (a) A police vehicle shall be equipped with flashing, rotates, or oscillating red or blue lights, for use in the performance of police duties.

- (b) A fire vehicle or ambulance available for public use or 2 for use of the United States, the state, or any unit of the 3 state, whether publicly or privately owned, shall be equipped 4 with flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights and used as 5 required for safety.
- (c) If authorized by the department of state police, a pri7 vate motor vehicle owned by a volunteer or paid fire fighter, a
 8 volunteer ambulance driver, or a licensed ambulance driver or
 9 attendant, or an emergency support vehicle used exclusively for
 10 emergencies and owned and operated by a federally recognized non11 profit charitable organization may be equipped with flashing,
 12 rotating, or oscillating red lights for use when responding to an
 13 emergency call if when in use the flashing, rotating, or oscil14 lating red lights are mounted on the roof section of the vehicle,
 15 either as a permanent installation or by means of suction cups or
 16 magnets and are clearly visible in a 360 degree arc from a dis17 tance of 500 feet when in use. A person operating lights under
 18 this subdivision at any time other than when responding to an
 19 emergency call is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- (d) Flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights, placed in a position as to be visible throughout an arc of 360 degrees, shall be used by a state, county, or municipal vehicle engaged in the removal of ice, snow, or other material from the highway and in other operations designed to control ice and snow.
- 26 emergency response action taken pursuant to state or federal law
 27 or a vehicle operated by an employee of the department of natural

- 1 resources that responds to a spill, emergency response action,
 2 complaint, or compliance activity may be equipped with flashing,
- 3 rotating, or oscillating amber lights. Such lights shall not be
- 4 activated unless the vehicle is at the scene of a spill, emer-
- 5 gency response action, complaint, or compliance activity.
- 6 (f) A vehicle to perform public utility service, a vehicle
- 7 owned or leased by and licensed as a business for use in the col-
- 8 lection and hauling of refuse, an automobile service car or
- 9 wrecker, a vehicle engaged in authorized highway repair or main-
- 10 tenance, a vehicle of a peace officer, a vehicle operated by a
- 11 rural letter carrier or a person under contract to deliver news-
- 12 papers or other publications by motor route, a vehicle utilized
- 13 for snow removal, a private security guard vehicle as authorized
- 14 in subsection (7), a hearse or funeral coach, a motor vehicle
- 15 while engaged in escorting or transporting an oversize load that
- 16 has been issued a permit by the state transportation department
- 17 or a local authority with respect to highways under its jurisdic-
- 18 tion, a vehicle owned by the national guard or a United States
- 19 military vehicle while traveling under the appropriate recognized
- 20 military authority, a motor vehicle while towing an implement of
- 21 husbandry, or an implement of husbandry may be equipped with
- 22 flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights. However, a
- 23 wrecker may be equipped with flashing, rotating, or oscillating
- 24 red lights which shall be activated only when the wrecker is
- 25 engaged in removing or assisting a vehicle at the scene of a
- 26 traffic accident or disablement. The flashing, rotating, or
- 27 oscillating amber lights shall not be activated except in those

- 1 circumstances that the warning produced by the lights is required
 2 for public safety.
- 3 (g) An authorized emergency vehicle may display flashing,
- 4 rotating, or oscillating white lights in conjunction with an
- 5 authorized emergency light as prescribed in this section.
- 6 (h) A private motor vehicle of a physician responding to an
- 7 emergency call may be equipped with and the physician may use
- 8 flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights mounted on the roof
- 9 section of the vehicle either as a permanent installation or by
- 10 means of magnets or suction cups and clearly visible in a 360
- 11 degree arc from a distance of 500 feet when in use. The physi-
- 12 cian shall first obtain written authorization from the county
- 13 sheriff.
- (I) A PUBLIC TRANSIT VEHICLE MAY BE EQUIPPED WITH A FLASH-
- 15 ING, OSCILLATING, OR ROTATING LIGHT MOUNTED ON THE ROOF OF THE
- 16 BUS APPROXIMATELY 6 FEET FROM THE REAR OF THE VEHICLE WHICH DIS-
- 17 PLAYS A WHITE LIGHT TO THE FRONT, SIDE, AND REAR OF THE BUS WHICH
- 18 LIGHT MAY BE ACTUATED BY THE DRIVER FOR USE ONLY IN INCLEMENT
- 19 WEATHER SUCH AS FOG, RAIN, OR SNOW, WHEN BOARDING OR DISCHARGING
- 20 PASSENGERS, FROM 1/2 HOUR BEFORE SUNSET UNTIL 1/2 HOUR AFTER SUN-
- 21 RISE, OR WHERE CONDITIONS HINDER THE VISIBILITY OF THE PUBLIC
- 22 TRANSIT VEHICLE. AS USED IN THIS SUBDIVISION, "PUBLIC TRANSIT
- 23 VEHICLE" MEANS A MOTOR VEHICLE, OTHER THAN A STATION WAGON OR
- 24 PASSENGER VAN, WITH A MANUFACTURERS RATED SEATING CAPACITY OF 16
- 25 OR MORE PASSENGERS AND A GROSS VEHICLE WEIGHT RATING OF MORE THAN
- 26 10,000 POUNDS.

(J) (i) A person engaged in the manufacture, sale, or 2 repair of flashing, rotating, or oscillating lights governed by 3 this subsection may possess the lights for the purpose of employ-4 ment, but shall not activate the lights upon the highway unless

5 authorized to do so under subsection (6).

(6) A person shall not sell, loan, or otherwise furnish a 7 flashing, rotating, or oscillating blue or red light designed 8 primarily for installation on an authorized emergency vehicle to 9 a person except a police officer, sheriff, deputy sheriff, autho-10 rized physician, volunteer or paid fire fighter, volunteer ambu-11 lance driver, licensed ambulance driver or attendant of the 12 state, a county or municipality within the state, a person 13 engaged in the business of operating an ambulance or wrecker 14 service, or a federally recognized nonprofit charitable organiza-15 tion which owns and operates an emergency support vehicle used 16 exclusively for emergencies. This subsection does not prohibit 17 an authorized vehicle, equipped with flashing, rotating, or 18 oscillating blue or red lights, from being operated by a person 19 other than a person described in this section if the person 20 receives authorization to operate the emergency vehicle from a 21 police officer, sheriff, deputy sheriff, authorized physician, 22 volunteer or paid fire fighter, volunteer ambulance driver, 23 licensed ambulance driver or attendant, a person operating an 24 ambulance or wrecker service, or a federally recognized nonprofit 25 charitable organization which owns and operates an emergency sup-26 port vehicle used exclusively for emergencies, except that the

27 authorization shall not permit the person to operate lights as

- 1 described in subsection (5)(a), (b), (c), (g), or (h), or to
- 2 exercise the privileges described in section 603. A person who
- 3 operates an authorized emergency vehicle in violation of the
- 4 terms of an authorization is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- 5 (7) A private motor vehicle of a security guard agency or
- 6 alarm company licensed pursuant to the private security guard act
- 7 of 1968, Act No. 330 of the Public Acts of 1968, being sections
- 8 338.1051 to 338.1085 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, may display
- 9 flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights. The flashing,
- 10 rotating, or oscillating amber lights shall not be activated on a
- 11 public highway when a vehicle is in motion.
- 12 (8) This section shall not be construed to prohibit,
- ${\it 13}$ restrict, or limit the use of lights authorized or required under
- 14 sections 697, 697a, and 698a.
- (9) A person who violates subsection (1), (2), (3), or (4)
- 16 is responsible for a civil infraction.
