# RATIONALE

The Playground Equipment Safety Act provides that after May 1, 1998, a person who manufactures or assembles public playground equipment for compensation must comply with standards in the "Handbook for Public Playground Safety" published for the U.S. Consumer Products Safety Commission, and the "Standard Consumer Safety Performance Specification for Playground Equipment for Public Use, ASTM F1487-93". A person who fails to comply with the standards is responsible for a civil infraction. The ASTM standard referred to in the Act, however, has been updated.

# **CONTENT**

The bill would amend the Playground Equipment Safety Act to revise the American Society for Testing and Materials standard entitled "Standard Consumer Safety Performance Specification for Playground Equipment for Public Use" by changing a reference from "ASTM F1487-93" to "ASTM F1487-95".

### **Supporting Argument**

Since the current Act incorporates the document by reference, the bill would simply update a reference from "ASTM F1487-93" to "ASTM F1487-95" used for the "Standard Consumer Safety Performance Specification for Playground Equipment for Public Use". Since the Act is designed to protect the safety of children on playgrounds, the most current standards should be used.
