

**HOUSE SUBSTITUTE FOR
SENATE BILL NO. 370**

A bill to make appropriations for the department of natural resources for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2000; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to create funds and accounts; to require reports; to prescribe certain powers and duties of certain state agencies and officials; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the various state agencies.

Sec. 201. (1) Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state

5

constitution of 1963, total state spending in this appropriation act is

6

\$213,231,800.00 and state appropriations to be paid to local units of

7

government are estimated at \$22,735,100.00. The following itemized

statement identifies appropriations from which spending to units of local

government will occur:

(2) If it appears to the principal executive officer of a department

or agency that state spending to local units of government will be less

than the amount that was projected to be expended under subsection (1),

the principal executive officer shall immediately give notice of the

25

approximate shortfall to the state budget director, the senate and house

26

appropriations committees, and the senate and house fiscal agencies.

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1 Sec. 202. The expenditures and fund sources authorized under this
2 act are subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
3 MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594.

4 Sec. 203. As used in this act:

5 (a) "Commission" means the commission of natural resources.

6 (b) "DAG" means the United States department of agriculture.

7 (c) "Department" means the department of natural resources.

8 (d) "DOC" means the United States department of commerce.

9 (e) "DOD" means the United States department of defense.

10 (f) "DOE" means the United States department of energy.

11 (g) "DOI" means the United States department of interior.

12 (h) "DOI-MMS" means DOI minerals management service.

13 (i) "DOT" means the United States department of transportation.

14 (j) "EPA" means the United States environmental protection agency.

15 (k) "FTE" means full-time equated.

16 (l) "IDG" means interdepartmental grant.

17 (m) "IDT" means intradepartmental transfer.

18 (n) "IGLFC" means the international Great Lakes fish commission.

19 (o) "MDOT" means the Michigan department of transportation.

20 Sec. 204. (1) Beginning October 1, 1999, a hiring freeze is imposed
21 on the state classified civil service. State departments and agencies
22 are prohibited from hiring any new full-time state classified civil serv-
23 ice employees or prohibited from filling any vacant state classified
24 civil service positions. This hiring freeze does not apply to internal
25 transfers of classified employees from 1 position to another within a
26 department or to positions that are funded with 80% or more federal or
27 restricted funds.

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1 (2) The state budget director shall grant exceptions to this hiring
2 freeze when the director believes that such a hiring freeze will result
3 in rendering a state department or agency unable to deliver basic
4 services. The state budget director shall report by the fifteenth of
5 each month to the chairpersons of the senate and house appropriations
6 committees the number of exclusions to the hiring freeze approved during
7 the previous month and the justification for each exclusion.

8 Sec. 205. The department of civil service shall bill departments
9 and agencies at the end of the first fiscal quarter for the 1% charges
10 authorized by section 5 of article XI of the state constitution of 1963.
11 Payments shall be made for the total amount of the billing by the end of
12 the second fiscal quarter.

13 Sec. 206. (1) From funds appropriated under part 1, the department
14 shall prepare a report that lists all of the following regarding grant,
15 loan, or grant and loan programs administered by the department for the
16 fiscal year ending on September 30, 2000:

17 (a) The name of each program.

18 (b) The goals, the criteria, including filing fees, and the nominat-
19 ing procedures, eligibility requirements, processes, and deadlines for
20 each program.

21 (c) The maximum and minimum grant and loan available and whether
22 there is a match requirement for each program.

23 (d) The amount of any required match, and whether in-kind contribu-
24 tions may be used as part or all of a required match.

25 (e) Information pertaining to the application process, timeline for
26 each program, and the contact people within the department.

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1 (f) The source of funds for each program, including the citation of
2 pertinent authorizing acts.

3 (g) Information regarding plans for the next fiscal year for the
4 phaseout, expansion, or changes for each program.

5 (h) A listing of all recipients of grants or loans awarded by the
6 department by type and amount of grant or loan.

7 (2) The reports required under this section shall be submitted to
8 the senate and house appropriations committees and the senate and house
9 fiscal agencies by January 1, 2001.

10 Sec. 207. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, each
11 of the following is appropriated:

12 (a) An amount not to exceed \$1,000,000.00 for federal contingency
13 funds.

14 (b) An amount not to exceed \$5,000,000.00 for state restricted con-
15 tingency funds.

16 (c) An amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for local contingency
17 funds.

18 (d) An amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for private contingency
19 funds.

20 (2) The funds appropriated under subsection (1)(a), (b), (c), and
21 (d) are not available for expenditure until they have been transferred to
22 another line item in this act pursuant to section 393(2) of the manage-
23 ment and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

24 Sec. 208. Appropriations of state restricted game and fish protec-
25 tion funds have been made to the following departments and agencies in
26 their respective appropriation bills. The amounts appropriated to these
27 departments and agencies are limited to the amounts listed below:

6 Sec. 209. The department shall provide the state budget director,
7 the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on natural resources,
8 and the senate and house fiscal agencies with an annual report on
9 restricted fund balances, projected revenues, and expenditures.

10 Sec. 210. The department shall submit a transition plan for the
11 future operation of the Michigan natural features inventory program to
12 the house and senate appropriations subcommittees on natural resources
13 and environmental quality by March 1, 2000. The plan shall provide for
14 the orderly and effective assumption of responsibility for inventory
15 activities, including, but not limited to, the survey, research, and doc-
16 umentation of the biological resources of the state. The plan shall
17 ensure that an integrated, complete, and current record of information
18 developed from this inventory program will be available to researchers
19 and the general public.

20 Sec. 211. The department shall receive and retain copies of all
21 reports from part 1 appropriations.

22 Sec. 212. All reports required in this act shall be made available
23 to the public primarily through Internet access, unless a printed version
24 is requested. The department shall provide electronic notification to
25 all legislative offices for specific reports requested by the
26 legislature.

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1 Sec. 213. Funds appropriated in part 1 shall not be used for the
2 purchase of foreign goods or services, or both, if competitively priced
3 American goods or services, or both, of comparable quality are
4 available. By May 1, 2000, the department shall submit a report to the
5 state budget director, the speaker and minority leader of the house of
6 representatives, the majority and minority leaders of the senate, the
7 chairpersons of the house and senate appropriations committees, and the
8 house and senate fiscal agencies on efforts to comply with this section.

9 Sec. 214. (1) In the expenditure of funds appropriated under this
10 act, the director of the department shall take all reasonable steps to
11 ensure that businesses in deprived and depressed communities compete for
12 and perform contracts to provide services or supplies, or both, for the
13 department.

14 (2) The director of the department shall strongly encourage firms
15 with which the department contracts to subcontract with businesses certi-
16 fied by the department of civil rights in depressed and deprived communi-
17 ties for services or supplies, or both.

18 Sec. 215. Sixty days before beginning any effort to privatize, the
19 department shall submit a complete project plan to the appropriate house
20 and senate appropriations subcommittees and the house and senate fiscal
21 agencies. The plan shall include the criteria under which the privatiza-
22 tion initiative will be evaluated. The evaluation shall be completed and
23 submitted to the appropriate house and senate appropriations subcommit-
24 tees and the house and senate fiscal agencies [30 days prior to renewing
the contract or extending the privatization initiative. No privatization
program shall extend beyond 36 months unless the department has determined,
in writing, that the program has demonstrated at least measurable savings
and has maintained quality of service or has documented a measurable
improvement in the quality of the product delivered or service performed.
If the term of privatization program is less than 36 months, but longer
than 12 months, the department shall make this determination before
extending the contract or initiative beyond its term.]

25 Sec. 216. (1) The department of management and budget and each
26 principal executive department and agency shall provide to the senate and
27 house of representatives standing committees on appropriations and the

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1 senate and house fiscal agencies a monthly report on all personal service
2 contracts awarded without competitive bidding, pricing, or rate setting.

3 The notification shall include all of the following:

4 (a) The total dollar amount of the contract.

5 (b) The duration of the contract.

6 (c) The name of the vendor.

7 (d) The type of service to be provided.

8 (2) For personal service contracts of \$100,000.00 or more, the
9 department of management and budget shall provide a monthly report on all
10 of the following:

11 (a) The total dollar amount of the contract.

12 (b) The duration of the contract.

13 (c) The name of the vendor.

14 (d) The type of service to be provided.

15 (3) The department of management and budget shall provide a monthly
16 listing of all bid requests or requests for proposal that were issued.

17 (4) Each principal executive department and agency shall provide a
18 monthly summary listing of information that identifies any authorizations
19 for personal service contracts that are provided to the department of
20 civil service pursuant to delegated authority granted to each principal
21 executive department and agency related to personal service contracts.

22 Sec. 217. If a department enters into a personal services contract
23 with any temporary service agency or similar contractor that hires or
24 subcontracts with a person who retired from employment in the department
25 under the early retirement program under section 19f of the state
26 employees' retirement act, 1943 PA 240, MCL 38.19f, the retired state
27 employee shall be limited to 500 hours for professional, technical, or

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1 clerical services and 250 hours for management services. This limitation
2 does not apply to computer technology services. This provision only
3 applies during a 24-month period after the date of retirement. This sec-
4 tion applies to each principal executive department and agency.

5 Sec. 219. The state budget director shall provide a list of pro-
6 posed work projects funded, in whole or in part, from appropriations in
7 this act to the house and senate appropriations committees on
8 November 15, 1999. This list shall provide detailed information includ-
9 ing a description of project activities and services, the total work
10 project funding level, spending for the fiscal year ending September 30,
11 1999, and the amount of budget authority required to complete the
12 project.

13 Sec. 221. A joint legislative work group on court settlements is
14 established. This work group shall consist of representatives of the
15 house and senate standing committees with primary responsibility for nat-
16 ural resources and environmental quality issues and the house and senate
17 appropriations subcommittees on natural resources and environmental
18 quality. Members shall be appointed on a bipartisan basis by the speaker
19 of the house of representatives and the senate majority leader.
20 Assistance and staff support to the work group may be provided by the
21 house and senate fiscal agencies. The work group shall issue a report on
22 February 1, 2000 to the members of the legislature which includes a
23 strategy for disbursing settlement revenue to impacted local governmental
24 units in a manner consistent with court settlement agreements.

25 Sec. 222. The department shall provide a report prepared by the
26 department's internal auditor for the prior fiscal year. This report
27 shall include a listing of each audit or investigation performed by the

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1 internal auditor pursuant to sections 486(4) and 487 of the management
2 and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1486 and 18.1487. The report shall
3 identify the proportion of time spent on each of the statutory responsi-
4 bilities described in sections 485(4), 486(4), and 487 of the management
5 and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1485, 18.1486, and 18.1487, and the
6 time spent on all other activities performed in the internal audit
7 function. The first report is due March 1, 2000, and beginning on May 1,
8 2002, biennially thereafter. The reports shall be submitted to the gov-
9 ernor, auditor general, the senate and house appropriations committees,
10 the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the director.

11 Sec. 223. In conjunction with the department of transportation, the
12 department shall develop plans for the maintenance, scheduling, and use
13 of all state-owned aircraft. It is the intent of the legislature that
14 these plans maximize the cost-efficient use of the state transportation
15 air fleet. The department shall prepare a joint report, coordinated by
16 the department of transportation, on the development of these plans.

17 **EXECUTIVE**

18 Sec. 301. The appropriations in section 102 for the commission may
19 be used for per diem payments to the members of commissions or committees
20 for a full day of commission or committee work at which a quorum is
21 present, for attending a hearing as authorized by the respective commis-
22 sion or committee, or for performing official business as authorized by
23 each respective commission or committee. The per diem payment for mem-
24 bers of the commission of natural resources shall be \$75.00.

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1 Sec. 302. The appropriation in section 102 for the office of
2 information and education shall be allocated by the department through
3 recognized natural resource education specialists to provide outreach
4 programs to school age children and to the general public. Natural
5 resources education shall include information on both consumptive and
6 nonconsumptive aspects of natural resources, such as hunting, fishing,
7 recreation, biodiversity protection, and ecosystem management. The
8 department shall provide a report on the "Buck Wilder" program to the
9 house and senate appropriations subcommittees on natural resources by
10 April 1, 2000. A report shall be prepared by a disinterested third party
11 and shall specify the amount and type of funds expended for the program
12 to date, the number of schools and students receiving program materials,
13 the number of teachers trained through this program, and any anticipated
14 future expenditures for materials and other program costs.

15 Sec. 303. On June 15, 2000, the department shall submit to the
16 house and senate appropriations subcommittees on natural resources and
17 the house and senate fiscal agencies a report on fish, game, and nongame
18 habitat improvement and treatment projects completed or planned during
19 the fiscal year ending September 30, 1999 and the fiscal year ending
20 September 30, 2000. This report shall include a list of all habitat
21 treatment and improvement projects by management unit. This list shall
22 be accompanied by all of the following information:

23 (a) The target species of wildlife or fish to benefit from unit
24 projects.

25 (b) The number of acres or, for a river or stream, the number of
26 feet treated or improved, the county in which the project is located, and
27 the methods of treatment or improvement.

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1 (c) The division with lead responsibility for the projects and all
2 organizations involved in the projects, including, but not limited to,
3 department personnel, contractors, or subcontractors.

4 (d) The total cost per acre and the funding sources supporting man-
5 agement unit projects. The report shall identify the program line item
6 supporting project expenditures.

7 (e) A separate summary, by fund or subfund, of all projects com-
8 pleted in the fiscal year ending September 30, 1999 or the fiscal year
9 ending September 30, 2000.

10 **ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES**

11 Sec. 401. The following are the estimated general purpose revenues
12 available in the game and fish protection fund for the state fiscal year
13 beginning October 1, 1999:

21 Sec. 402. Of the state general fund/general purpose resources
22 appropriated in section 103 to administrative services, \$2,210,000.00 is
23 for the game and fish protection fund to provide senior citizen license
24 fee reimbursement under section 43546 of the natural resources and
25 environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.43546.

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1 DEPARTMENTAL OPERATIONAL SUPPORT

2 Sec. 501. On February 1, 2000, the department shall report to the
3 senate and house appropriations subcommittees on natural resources and to
4 the senate and house fiscal agencies on gifts, bequests, grants, and
5 donations. The report shall include both of the following:

6 (a) The amount of contributions, gifts, bequests, grants, and dona-
7 tions received by the department for the fiscal year ending September 30,
8 1999.

9 (b) A listing of the expenditures made from the amounts received as
10 reported in subdivision (a).

11 WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT

12 Sec. 601. Of the funds appropriated in section 105 for wildlife
13 management, \$85,000.00 shall be used to fund the third year of a 5-year
14 research study at Michigan State University on the control of swimmer's
15 itch in inland lakes. Local organizations shall contribute at least
16 \$15,000.00 to this project. A report on the progress of the project
17 shall be presented to the house and senate appropriations committees and
18 house and senate fiscal agencies by December 31, 2000.

19 Sec. 602. The department shall work with representatives of the
20 captive cervidae industry to develop clear definitions of "captive cervi-
21 dae farm" and "captive cervidae hunting preserve" and shall report these
22 definitions to the legislature by April 1, 2000.

23 Sec. 603. The department shall reimburse the department of agricul-
24 ture for costs incurred for indemnification payments for livestock losses

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1 caused by wolves under the animal industry act of 1987, 1988 PA 466, MCL
2 287.701 to 287.747.

3 Sec. 604. The department of agriculture shall reimburse the depart-
4 ment of natural resources for those costs associated with monitoring and
5 testing wildlife for bovine tuberculosis which are jointly agreed to by
6 the department of agriculture and the department of natural resources to
7 be in excess of efforts necessary to eradicate bovine tuberculosis from
8 Michigan's wild free-ranging deer herd.

9 Sec. 605. (1) A work group consisting of representatives of the
10 department, the department of agriculture, and the captive cervidae
11 industry shall meet and develop clear definitions of "captive cervidae
12 hunting preserve" and "captive cervidae farm". The work group shall
13 report its recommended definitions to the house and senate appropriations
14 committees and the house and senate standing committees on natural
15 resources by April 1, 2000.

16 (2) Captive cervidae farms meeting the definition developed in this
17 section and agreed to by the house and senate standing committees on nat-
18 ural resources shall be regulated by the department of agriculture.
19 Operating permits for captive cervidae farms shall be disapproved or
20 issued by the department of agriculture within 60 days of receipt.
21 Captive cervidae preserves meeting the definition developed in this sec-
22 tion and agreed to by the house and senate standing committees on natural
23 resources, and lands on which captive cervidae is harvested or hunted,
24 shall be regulated by the department.

1 FISHERIES MANAGEMENT

2 Sec. 701. The department shall annually report to the state budget
3 director, the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on natural
4 resources, and the senate and house fiscal agencies the amount and dispo-
5 sition of funds received from the Great Lakes fisheries trust. The
6 report shall include a copy of the trust's annual report and a copy of
7 form 990 filed with the attorney general's office.

8 Sec. 702. The department shall not impede the certification process
9 for water control structures on Michigan waterways. The department shall
10 fund from funds appropriated in part 1 all non-water-quality studies or
11 requirements that the department requests of either of the following:

12 (a) The department of environmental quality as a condition for issu-
13 ance of a certification under section 401 of the federal water pollution
14 control act, title IV of chapter 758, 86 Stat. 877, 33 U.S.C. 1341.

15 (b) The federal energy regulatory commission as a condition of
16 licensing under the federal power act, chapter 285, 41 Stat. 1063, 16
17 U.S.C. 791a to 793, 796 to 797, 798 to 818, 820 to 824a, and 824b to
18 825r.

19 Sec. 703. (1) From the appropriation in section 106 for stream hab-
20 itat improvement, not more than \$575,000.00 shall be allocated for grants
21 to watershed councils, resource development councils, soil conservation
22 districts, local governmental units, and other nonprofit organizations
23 for stream habitat stabilization and soil erosion control.

24 (2) The fisheries division of the department shall develop priority
25 and cost estimates for all recommended projects. Priority shall be given
26 to applications that use the Michigan civilian conservation corps to its
27 greatest ability.

[Sec. 704. The department shall report annually the number of fish
advisory booklets distributed by all fishing license vendors. This report
shall be given to house and senate appropriations committee members.]

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1 PARKS AND RECREATION

2 Sec. 801. The department may charge the appropriations contained in
3 part 1, including all special maintenance and capital projects appropri-
4 ated for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2000, for engineering serv-
5 ices provided, a standard percentage fee to be determined by the state
6 budget director, and may use the revenue derived to support the engineer-
7 ing services charges provided for in part 1.

8 Sec. 802. In accordance with section 1902(2) of the natural
9 resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.1902,
10 there is appropriated from the Michigan natural resources trust fund to
11 the Michigan state parks endowment fund an amount not to exceed
12 \$10,000,000.00 for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2000.

13 Sec. 803. The department shall develop a feasibility study to
14 comply with each lake water protection plan which requires owners of
15 lakefront property to transport and dispose of sanitary sewerage or storm
16 water sewerage, or both, at an off-site location. The department shall
17 provide a copy of each study to each legislator who represents the dis-
18 trict where the lakefront property is located, and to the senate and
19 house appropriations subcommittees on natural resources.

20 FOREST RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

21 Sec. 901. The commission may establish and collect fees for the
22 processing of applications for the use of state forests that require
23 extensive review. The fees shall cover the cost to the department of
24 processing the applications. Any unexpended application fees for the use
25 of state forests, along with any excess collections from prior fiscal

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1 years, shall be carried over into subsequent fiscal years and shall be
2 available for appropriation.

3 Sec. 902. Of the funds appropriated in section 109, the department
4 shall not allow the amount of timber marked for harvest to decrease below
5 855,000 cords provided that the department takes into consideration the
6 impact of timber harvesting on wildlife habitat and recreation uses.

7 Sec. 903. The appropriation in section 109 for abandoned mine shaft
8 closures shall be used to restrict access to or cap abandoned mine shafts
9 in order of priority as determined by the department.

10 Sec. 904. With money received from the sale of timber on state land
11 and appropriated in part 1, the department may employ an additional 20
12 full-time temporary employees to serve as fire fighters for the 6-month
13 period in which the risk of forest fires is the highest.

14 Sec. 905. From the amounts appropriated in section 109 for forest
15 fire protection, \$100,000.00 shall be used by the department to establish
16 3 standby locations for aircraft that may be used for wildfire
17 suppression.

18 **LAND AND MINERAL SERVICES**

19 Sec. 1001. The department may charge land acquisition projects
20 appropriated for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2000, and for prior
21 fiscal years, a standard percentage fee to be determined by the state
22 budget director, and may use the revenue derived to support the land
23 acquisition service charges provided for in section 110.

24 Sec. 1002. The land sale fund is created. An amount equal to the
25 cost of personal services, printing, postage, advertising, contractual

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1 services, and facility rental associated with tax reverted lands shall be
2 deducted from the sales and credited to the land sale fund.

3 Sec. 1003. If a contract is terminated with an operator of a
4 state-owned gravel pit, and there remains an asphalt plant and an inven-
5 tory of reclaimed asphalt products (RAP) or other stone products, the
6 operator may continue to use the site, including bringing in stone pro-
7 ducts, until the RAP inventory is depleted or for 2 years, whichever
8 comes first, or the department shall reimburse the contractor fair market
9 value for the remaining stone products.

10 Sec. 1004. (1) The \$1,000,000.00 appropriation in part 1 for grants
11 to communities for cleanup and maintenance of tax reverted properties
12 shall be granted to counties, cities, villages, and townships for the
13 purpose of remediating threats to public health and safety traced to tax
14 reverted properties within their jurisdictions. An announcement of this
15 grant program shall be provided to all eligible jurisdictions before
16 March 1, 2000. This announcement shall include evaluation criteria,
17 forms, and deadlines. The application deadline shall be May 1, 2000.

18 (2) The department shall provide a list of approved grants to the
19 house and senate appropriations subcommittees and the house and senate
20 fiscal agencies by July 1, 2000.

21 **LAW ENFORCEMENT**

22 Sec. 1101. A conservation officer or other employee or agent of the
23 department who is paid through an appropriation provided in part 1 and
24 who is acting in an investigative or other official capacity shall not
25 enter a private residence, vehicle, boat, or other private property

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1 without a warrant or consent of the owner, or unless otherwise allowed by
2 law.

3 Sec. 1102. The appropriation in section 113 for snowmobile law
4 enforcement grants shall be used to provide 100% grants to local law
5 enforcement to enforce part 821 of the natural resources and environmen-
6 tal protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.82101 to 324.82160, including
7 rules promulgated under that part and ordinances enacted pursuant to that
8 part. Any funds not distributed to counties revert back to the local law
9 enforcement fund. Counties shall provide a monthly, quarterly, semiannu-
10 al, and annual report to the department.

11 **GRANTS**

12 Sec. 1201. The amount appropriated in section 113 for federal-rural
13 community fire protection shall be awarded as grants to local fire pro-
14 tection departments. To be eligible, local fire protection departments
15 shall be located in governmental units or fire protection districts with
16 permanent populations of less than 10,000 and with 1,000 or more acres of
17 publicly owned forested land.

18 Sec. 1202. Of the funds appropriated in section 113 for marine
19 safety grants, \$400,000.00 is appropriated to provide additional patrol
20 hours on Michigan lakes. The department shall report on the distribution
21 of these additional funds to the senate and house appropriations subcom-
22 mittees on natural resources and the senate and house fiscal agencies by
23 September 30, 2000.

24 Sec. 1203. Of the amount appropriated in section 113 for off-road
25 vehicle trail improvement grants, not less than \$25,000.00 or more than

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1 \$135,000.00 shall be available for counties that contain state park
2 off-road vehicle areas and apply for law enforcement assistance to regu-
3 late off-road vehicle use.
