# SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE BILL NO. 370

A bill to make appropriations for the department of natural resources for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2000; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to create funds and accounts; to require reports; to prescribe certain powers and duties of certain state agencies and officials; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the various state agencies.

- 2 service employees or prohibited from filling any vacant state classified
- 3 civil service positions. This hiring freeze does not apply to internal

- 16 Sec. 210. (1) Funds appropriated in part 1 for permit review
- 17 shall not be provided to a non-governmental organization that
- 18 acquires land for endangered species habitats.
- 19 (2) As of September 30, 2000, funds appropriated in part 1 for
- inventories and/or data base maintenance of the Michigan Natural Features Inventory shall not be provided to a non-governmental organization that purchases land for the purpose of protecting endangered species habitat.
  - (3) These prohibitions do not apply to universities or other educational institutions.
- 21 Sec. 211. The department shall receive and retain copies of all
- 22 reports from part 1 appropriations.
- 23 Sec. 212. All reports required in this act shall be made available
- 24 to the public primarily through Internet access, unless a printed version
- 25 is requested. The department shall provide electronic notification to
- 26 all legislative offices for specific reports requested by the
- 27 legislature.

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For Fiscal Year Ending September 30, 2000

- 1 Sec. 213. Funds appropriated in part 1 shall not be used for the
- 2 purchase of foreign goods or services, or both, if competitively priced
- 3 American goods or services, or both, of comparable quality are

- 22 tion initiative will be evaluated. The evaluation shall be completed and
- 23 submitted to the appropriate house and senate appropriations subcommit-
- 24 tees and the house and senate fiscal agencies within 30 months.
- 25 Sec. 216. (1) The department of management and budget and each
- 26 principal executive department and agency shall provide to the senate and
- 27 house of representatives standing committees on appropriations and the

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- 1 senate and house fiscal agencies a monthly report on all personal service
- 2 contracts awarded without competitive bidding, pricing, or rate setting.
- 3 The notification shall include all of the following:
- 4 (a) The total dollar amount of the contract.

- 7 (d) The type of service to be provided.
- 8 (2) For personal service contracts of \$100,000.00 or more, the
- 9 department of management and budget shall provide a monthly report on all
- 10 of the following:
- 11 (a) The total dollar amount of the contract.
- 12 (b) The duration of the contract.
- 13 (c) The name of the vendor.
- 14 (d) The type of service to be provided.
- 15 (3) The department of management and budget shall provide a monthly
- 16 listing of all bid requests or requests for proposal that were issued.
- 17 (4) Each principal executive department and agency shall provide a
- 18 monthly summary listing of information that identifies any authorizations
- 19 for personal service contracts that are provided to the department of
- 20 civil service pursuant to delegated authority granted to each principal
- 21 executive department and agency related to personal service contracts.
- Sec. 217. If a department enters into a personal services contract
- 23 with any temporary service agency or similar contractor that hires or
- 24 subcontracts with a person who retired from employment in the department
- 25 under the early retirement program under section 19f of the state
- 26 employees' retirement act, 1943 PA 240, MCL 38.19f, the retired state
- 27 employee shall be limited to 500 hours for professional, technical, or

### 17 DEPARTMENTAL OPERATIONAL SUPPORT

- 18 Sec. 501. On February 1, 2000, the department shall report to the
- 19 senate and house appropriations subcommittees on natural resources and to
- 20 the senate and house fiscal agencies on gifts, bequests, grants, and
- 21 donations. The report shall include both of the following:
- 22 (a) The amount of contributions, gifts, bequests, grants, and dona-
- 23 tions received by the department for the fiscal year ending September 30,

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- 1 (b) A listing of the expenditures made from the amounts received as

#### 3 WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT

- 4 Sec. 601. Of the funds appropriated in section 105 for wildlife

- 6 research study at Michigan State University on the control of swimmer's
- 7 itch in inland lakes. Local organizations shall contribute at least
- 8 \$15,000.00 to this project. A report on the progress of the project

- 14 Sec. 705. The department shall not impede the certification process
- 15 for water control structures on Michigan waterways. The department shall
- 16 fund from funds appropriated in part 1 all studies or requirements that
- 17 the department requires of an applicant for issuance of a certification
- 18 under section 401 of title IV of the federal water pollution control act,
- 19 chapter 758, 86 Stat. 877, 33 U.S.C. 1341, or requests from the federal
- 20 energy regulatory commission as a condition of licensing under the fed-
- 21 eral power act, chapter 285, 41 Stat. 1063, 16 U.S.C. 791a to 793, 796 to

#### 1 PARKS AND RECREATION

- 2 Sec. 801. The department may charge the appropriations contained in
- 3 part 1, including all special maintenance and capital projects appropri-
- 4 ated for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2000, for engineering serv-
- 5 ices provided, a standard percentage fee to be determined by the state
- 6 budget director, and may use the revenue derived to support the engineer-
- 7 ing services charges provided for in part 1.
- 8 Sec. 802. In accordance with section 1902(2) of the natural
- 9 resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.1902,
- 10 there is appropriated from the Michigan natural resources trust fund to
- 11 the Michigan state parks endowment fund an amount not to exceed
- 12 \$10,000,000.00 for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2000.
- 13 Sec. 803. The department shall develop a feasibility study to

#### 15 REAL ESTATE

- 16 Sec. 1001. The department may charge land acquisition projects
- 17 appropriated for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2000, and for prior
- 18 fiscal years, a standard percentage fee to be determined by the state
- 19 budget director, and may use the revenue derived to support the land
- 20 acquisition service charges provided for in section 110.
- 21 Sec. 1002. The land sale fund is created. An amount equal to the
- 22 cost of personal services, printing, postage, advertising, contractual
- 23 services, and facility rental associated with tax reverted lands shall be
- 24 deducted from the sales and credited to the land sale fund.

Senate Bill No. 370 as amended March 24, 1999 For Fiscal Year Ending 30 September 30, 2000

- 1 Sec. 1003. If a contract is terminated with an operator of a
- 2 state-owned gravel pit, and there remains an asphalt plant and an
- 3 inventory of reclaimed asphalt products (RAP) or other stone products,
- 4 the operator may continue to use the site, including bringing in stone
- 5 products, until the RAP inventory is depleted or in 2 years, whichever
- 6 comes first.

#### 7 GRANTS

- 8 Sec. 1101. The amount appropriated in section 113 for federal-rural
- 9 community fire protection/dry hydrant demonstration projects shall be
- 10 awarded as grants to local fire protection departments. To be eligible,
- 11 local fire protection departments shall be located in governmental units
- 12 or fire protection districts with permanent populations of less than
- 13 10,000 and with 1,000 or more acres of publicly owned forested land.

  LAW ENFORCEMENT

Sec. 1200. Of the funds appropriated in section 111 for General law enforcement, \$10,000 shall be allocated to provide a reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of a person or persons responsible for the murder of a licensed hunter while in the act of legal hunting.
