- 16 Sec. 208. Money appropriated in part 1 shall not be used for the
- 17 purchase of foreign goods or services if competitively priced American
- 18 goods or services of comparable quality are available.
- 19 Sec. 209. Of the state general fund/general purpose revenue appro-
- 20 priated in this act, \$57,717,000.00 represents a state spending increase
- 21 over the amount provided to the department of state police for the fiscal
- 22 year ending September 30, 1994, and may be used to meet state match
- 23 requirements of programs contained in the federal violent crime control
- 24 and law enforcement act of 1994, or successor grant programs, so that any
- 25 additional federal money received supplements funding provided to the
- 26 department of state police in this act.

- 1 Sec. 210. The department's internal auditor shall prepare a report
- 2 on his or her activities during the 1998-1999 fiscal year. The report

- 3 shall include a list of each audit or investigation performed pursuant to
- 4 sections 486(4) and 487 of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
- 5 MCL 18.1486 and 18.1487. The report shall identify the time spent on
- 6 each of the statutory responsibilities listed in sections 485(4), 486(4),
- 7 and 487 of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1485,
- 8 18.1486, and 18.1487, and the time spent on all other activities per-
- 9 formed in the internal audit function. The first report is due on March
- 10 1, 2000 and biennially thereafter beginning on May 1, 2001. The report
- 11 shall be delivered to the governor, auditor general, the senate and house
- 12 appropriations committees, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the
- 13 director.
- 14 Sec. 211. The department is authorized to receive and to expend
- 15 upon receipt any federal or state forfeiture money. Each quarter, the
- 16 department shall notify the state police appropriations subcommittees of
- 17 the house and senate and the house and senate fiscal agencies of the
- 18 receipt of any federal or state forfeiture money.
- 19 Sec. 212. Any law enforcement entity receiving GF/GP funds from
- 20 this act shall not evaluate an employee or consider an employee for pro-
- 21 motion or assignment on the basis of motor vehicle citations issued.
- Sec. 213. Money appropriated under this act shall be used to estab-
- 23 lish a sex offenders registry website on the Internet. The website shall
- 24 be capable of being linked to and immediately be accessible from the web-
- 25 sites of public officials, including legislators. The sex offenders reg-
- 26 istry website shall contain a listing of all those persons in the state
- 27 convicted of a sex offense and required to be registered with the state

1 under the sex offenders registration act, 1994 PA 295, MCL 28.721 to

2 28.732. Persons listed on the sex offenders registry website shall have

- 6 Sec. 214. (1) It is the intent of the legislature that the
- 7 department shall not provide any subsidy for contractual services it
- 8 provides.
- (2) When the department provides contractual services to a local unit of government, the department shall be reimbursed for all costs incurred in providing the services, including, but not limited to, retirement and overtime costs.
  - (3) Contractual services provided to an entity other than a local unit of government may be provided by department personnel, but only on an overtime basis outside the normal work schedule of the personnel.
- (4) This section does not apply to state agencies.

  Sec. 215. (1) The director shall take all reasonable steps to
- 11 ensure businesses in deprived and depressed communities compete for and
- 12 perform contracts to provide services or supplies, or both, for the
- 13 department.
- 14 (2) The director shall strongly encourage firms with which the
- 15 department contracts to subcontract with certified businesses in
- 16 depressed and deprived communities for services or supplies, or both.
- 17 Sec. 216. (1) The department shall submit to the department of man-
- 18 agement and budget, the house and senate appropriations committees, the
- 19 house and senate fiscal agencies, and the house and senate standing com-
- 20 mittees with jurisdiction over technology issues, quarterly reports on
- 21 the department's efforts to change the department's computer software and
- 22 hardware as necessary to perform properly in the year 2000 and beyond.
- 23 These reports shall identify actual progress in comparison to the
- 24 department's approved work plan for these efforts.
- 25 (2) Beginning with the report on April 1, 2000, the department shall
- 26 submit to the department of management and budget, the senate and house
- 27 of representatives standing committees on appropriations, the senate and

1 house fiscal agencies, and the senate and house standing committees

- 2 having jurisdiction over technology issues quarterly reports identifying
- 3 for the immediately preceding quarter any problems with information sys-
- 4 tems, any occurrences of information system failure as a result of non-
- 5 compliance with year 2000 standards, and any previously unidentified area
- 6 of impact. These reports shall identify all systems needing corrective
- 7 action and the contractual obligations of all accountable parties. These
- 8 reports shall give the status of the progress made in repairing and test-
- 9 ing applications, the status of all vendor-supplied solutions to prob-
- 10 lems, information on the activation of manual or contract processes used
- 11 to correct problems, and an itemization of the additional costs
- 12 incurred.
- 13 (3) The department may present progress billings to the department
- 14 of management and budget for the costs incurred in changing computer
- 15 software and hardware as necessary to perform properly in the year 2000
- 16 and beyond and for the costs of corrective action. At the time progress
- 17 billings are presented for reimbursement, the department shall identify
- 18 the funding sources that should support the work performed, and the
- 19 department of management and budget shall forward the appropriate
- 20 funding.
- 21 Sec. 217. Within 10 working days after formal presentation of the
- 22 executive budget, the state budget director shall report to the members
- 23 of the senate and house appropriations committees and to the senate and
- 24 house fiscal agencies on the amounts and sources of all capped federal
- 25 funds, special revenue funds as defined in the state of Michigan's com-
- 26 prehensive annual financial report, and the healthy Michigan fund, and an

- 1 accounting of the state departments or agencies in which the executive
- 2 budget proposed to spend the funds.
- 3 Sec. 218. In conjunction with the department of transportation, the
- 4 department of state police shall develop plans for the maintenance,
- 5 scheduling, and use of all state-owned aircraft. It is the intent of the
- 6 legislature that these plans maximize the safe and cost-efficient use of
- 7 the state transportation air fleet. The department shall prepare a joint
- 8 report, coordinated by the department of transportation, on the develop-
- 9 ment of these plans.
- 10 Sec. 220. Sixty days prior to beginning any effort to privatize,
- 11 the department shall submit a complete project plan to the appropriate
- 12 house and senate appropriations subcommittees and the house and senate
- 13 fiscal agencies. The plan shall include the criteria under which the
- 14 privatization initiative will be evaluated. The evaluation shall be com-
- 15 pleted and submitted to the appropriate house and senate appropriations
- 16 subcommittees and the house and senate fiscal agencies within 30 months.
- 17 Sec. 221. The department shall create and retain copies of reports
- 18 for all money appropriated under section 101.
- 19 Sec. 222. All reports required in this act shall be made available
- 20 to the public primarily through Internet access, unless a printed version
- 21 is requested. The department shall provide electronic notification to
- 22 all legislative offices for specific reports requested by the
- 23 legislature.
- 24 Sec. 223. Not later than March 15, 2000 and September 30, 2000, the
- 25 department shall report to the state police appropriations subcommittees
- 26 of the house and senate and the house and senate fiscal agencies. The

1 report shall contain the following information regarding the department's

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- 2 activities related to casino gaming oversight:
- 3 (a) The amount of money received and expended.
- 4 (b) The nature and structure of the casino gaming oversight unit.
- 5 (c) The positions and classifications of employees assigned.
- 6 (d) The number of full-time and part-time employees and the aggre-
- 7 gate number of FTEs.
- 8 (e) The number of enlisted and civilian positions.
- 9 (f) The duties and responsibilities of the assigned employees.
- 10 (g) The immediate past position of the enlisted employees assigned.

Sec. 224. The department shall prepare a report on the costs of processing the fingerprints of concealed weapon license applicants. The department shall submit the report to the house and senate appropriations subcommittees on state police/military and veterans affairs and the house and senate fiscal agencies by February 1, 2000.

### 11 FIRE MARSHAL

- 12 Sec. 301. (1) The department shall prepare a detailed report and
- 13 deliver it to the senate and house subcommittees on the state police not
- 14 later than May 15, 2000.
- 15 (2) The report shall contain input from a delegate appointed from
- 16 and by the following organizations:
- 17 (a) Michigan fire chiefs association.
- 18 (b) Michigan state fireman's association.
- 19 (c) Michigan firefighter's union.
- 20 (d) Michigan fire service instructors association.
- 21 (e) Michigan fire inspectors society.
- 22 (f) Michigan chapter of the international association of arson
- 23 investigators.
- 24 (3) The report shall contain information about the quality and
- 25 adequacy of service from the state fire investigation, education, and

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- 1 training under the proposed reorganization of the fire marshal division
- 2 responsibilities. The report shall be based on the performance of the
- 3 fire marshal division in the performance of its fire safety duties during
- 4 the first 6 months of fiscal year 1999-2000.

## 5 <u>HIGHWAY SAFETY PLANNING</u>

- 6 Sec. 401. In addition to the money appropriated in section 105 and
- 7 section 109, the department may receive and expend state restricted funds
- 8 for the support of the secondary road patrol and traffic accident
- 9 enhanced grants program and training to local units in accordance with
- 10 section 629e of the Michigan vehicle code, 1949 PA 300, MCL 257.629e.
- 11 Expenditures for the support of the secondary road patrol and traffic
- 12 accident enhanced grants and training to local units program shall not
- 13 exceed revenues received.

### 14 CRIMINAL JUSTICE DATA CENTER

- 15 Sec. 501. The money appropriated in section 107 for computer serv-
- 16 ices shall be funded by LEIN user fees sufficient to pay 1/3 of the serv-
- 17 ice and contract maintenance costs of the LEIN mainframe computer
- 18 system.
- 19 Sec. 503. A portion of the funds appropriated in section 107 for
- 20 the criminal justice data center shall be used by the department to
- 21 produce a written report detailing departmental policies regarding access
- 22 to and use of information from the law enforcement information network.
- 23 The report shall include a description of departmental measures to

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- 1 protect the security of information in the law enforcement information
- 2 network including safeguards that would prevent unauthorized persons from

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- 3 obtaining information from the law enforcement information network. The
- 4 department shall deliver a copy of this report to the senate and house
- 5 appropriations committees no later than April 1, 2000.
- 6 Sec. 504. The criminal justice information systems policy council
- 7 shall encourage members of the law enforcement agencies in the state to
- 8 be sensitive to, and note when necessary, activities or circumstances
- 9 that may suggest the unauthorized access or misuse of information from
- 10 the law enforcement information network. The criminal justice informa-
- 11 tion systems policy council shall advise LEIN auditors, as a part of
- 12 their audit of law enforcement agencies, to investigate in depth all sus-
- 13 pected incidents of improper access or improper use of information from
- 14 the law enforcement information network and determine whether or not
- 15 those incidents were illegal. In those incidents which may be determined
- 16 to be illegal, the executive secretary for the council shall determine
- 17 whether those incidents were of a negligent or criminal nature. When an
- 18 incident is determined to be an illegal act, the council shall inform the
- 19 chairs of both the senate and house appropriations committees.

#### 20 FORENSIC SCIENCES

- 21 Sec. 601. It is the intent of the legislature that the grant to the
- 22 city of Detroit under section 108 be allocated by the city to supplement
- 23 the city's appropriations for the Detroit crime lab and the Detroit police special events account.

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- 24 1 Sec. 602. (1) The department shall distribute a copy of the
- 2 department's protocol for retaining and purging DNA analysis samples and
- 3 records to each police agency in this state.
- (2) The department shall report to the house and senate appropria-
- 5 tions subcommittees on state police and the house and senate fiscal agen-
- 6 cies whenever any changes to the department's DNA protocol are made.

#### 7 COMMISSION ON LAW ENFORCEMENT STANDARDS

- 8 Sec. 701. The money appropriated to the COLES for maintenance and
- 9 delivery of training to locals is provided in accordance with a state
- 10 reimbursement policy in which 100% of the determined state reimbursement
- 11 rate shall be distributed upon certification by the COLES.
- 12 Sec. 702. The money appropriated in section 109 for community
- 13 policing coordination shall be used by the department to work in conjunc-
- 14 tion with local criminal justice agencies to identify appropriate curric-
- 15 ulum to support community policing. The department shall work as a coor-
- 16 dinator to deliver community policing training.

### 17 EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

- 18 Sec. 801. (1) The state director of emergency management may expend
- 19 money appropriated under this act to call upon any agency or department
- 20 of the state or any resource of the state to protect life or property or
- 21 to provide for the health or safety of the population in any area of the
- 22 state in which the governor proclaims a state of emergency or state of
- 23 disaster under 1945 PA 302, MCL 10.31 to 10.33, or under the emergency

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- 1 management act, 1976 PA 390, MCL 30.401 to 30.420. The state director of
- 2 emergency management may expend the amounts the director considers neces-
- 3 sary to accomplish these purposes. The director shall submit to the
- 4 state budget director as soon as possible a complete report of all
- 5 actions taken under the authority of this section. The report shall con-
- 6 tain, as a separate item, a statement of all money expended that is not
- 7 reimbursable from federal money. The state budget director shall review
- 8 the expenditures and submit recommendations to the legislature in regard
- 9 to any possible need for a supplemental appropriation.
- 10 (2) In addition to the money appropriated in this act, the depart-
- 11 ment may receive and expend money from local, private, federal, or state
- 12 sources for the purpose of providing emergency management training to
- 13 local or private interests and for the purpose of supporting emergency
- 14 preparedness, response, recovery, and mitigation activity.

#### 15 UNIFORM SERVICES

- 16 Sec. 901. The department shall not expend any portion of the money
- 17 appropriated in this act, including any expenditure made under an execu-
- 18 tive order, to plan for or to implement a roadblock or check lane system
- 19 that has as its primary objective the deterrence or detection of intoxi-
- 20 cated drivers in this state.
- 21 Sec. 902. It is the intent of the legislature that the department
- 22 maintain the maximum number of troopers on the road from the available
- 23 money appropriated in this act.
- 24 Sec. 903. State police enlisted personnel who are employed to
- 25 enforce traffic laws as provided in section 629e of the Michigan vehicle

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- 1 code, 1949 PA 300, MCL 257.629e, shall not be prohibited from responding
- 2 to crimes in progress or other emergency situations, and are responsible
- 3 for protecting every citizen of this state from harm.

### 4 SPECIAL OPERATIONS

- 5 Sec. 1001. (1) Money appropriated under section 113 for the
- 6 Michigan public safety communications system shall be expended upon
- 7 approval of an expenditure plan by the state budget director.
- 8 (2) The department of state police shall assess all subscribers of
- 9 the Michigan public safety communications system reasonable access and
- 10 maintenance fees.
- 11 (3) All money received by the department of state police under this
- 12 section shall be deposited to the state general fund pursuant to section
- 13 443 of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1443.
- 14 (4) The department of state police shall provide a report to the
- 15 house and senate appropriations committees, house and senate fiscal agen-
- 16 cies, and the state budget director on April 15, 2000, and on October 15,
- 17 2000, indicating the amount of revenue collected under this section and
- 18 deposited to the state general fund for the immediately preceding 6-month
- 19 period.
- 20 Sec. 1002. In addition to the appropriations in section 113 to the
- 21 department of state police for the aviation program, the department is
- 22 authorized to sell its aircraft and the proceeds from the sale are appro-
- 23 priated and may be applied to the renovation cost of replacement
- 24 aircraft.

#### 1 CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS

- 2 Sec. 1101. (1) There is sufficient money appropriated in
- 3 section 113 to criminal investigations to ensure that the citizens in a
- 4 service area of any state police post in the vicinity of a state prison
- 5 do not experience a downgrading of state police services in their area.
- 6 Criminal investigations shall be available by temporary or permanent
- 7 assignment of a detective when either a temporary or permanent prison
- 8 facility is opened.
- 9 (2) If the department is unable to comply with subsection (1) and
- 10 there is a prison scheduled to open, the department shall provide troop-
- 11 ers to serve as investigators on an interim basis.
- 12 Sec. 1102. In addition to the money appropriated in part 1, the
- 13 department may receive and expend state restricted funds for the support
- 14 of the private security guard licensure program. Expenditures for the
- 15 support of the private security guard licensure program shall not exceed
- 16 revenues received.
  - Sec. 1103. (1) It is the intent of the legislature that the department of state police explore the feasibility of establishing an internet crime unit within criminal investigations.
  - (2) The department shall report its findings to the appropriations subcommittees on state police/military and veterans affairs on or before January 15, 2000.

### 17 MOTOR CARRIER ENFORCEMENT

- 18 Sec. 1201. The appropriation in section 115 for school bus inspec-
- 19 tions shall be used by the department of state police to inspect each
- 20 school bus and pupil transportation vehicle annually, as required under
- 21 section 715a of the Michigan vehicle code, 1949 PA 300, MCL 257.715a, and
- 22 section 39 of the pupil transportation act, 1990 PA 187, MCL 257.1839.
- 23 Sec. 1202. During such time when a state weigh station is closed,
- 24 the sign denoting its closure shall include a statement informing the

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- 1 public that weight and safety enforcement is being maintained by motor
- 2 carrier officers on mobile patrol.
