EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

A bill to make appropriations for the department of education and certain other purposes relating to education for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2000 to provide for the expenditure of the appropriations; to prescribe the powers and duties of certain state departments, school districts, and other governmental bodies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by certain legal entities and state agencies.

1 GENERAL SECTIONS

2 Sec. 201. (1) Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state 3 constitution of 1963, total state spending under part 1 for fiscal year 4 1999-2000 is \$65,161,700.00 and state appropriations to be paid to 5 local units of government are as follows:

Sec. 202. The expenditures and funding sources authorized under this bill are subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594.

22 Sec. 203. (1) Beginning October 1, 1999, a hiring freeze is imposed on the state classified civil service. State departments and agencies 23 24 are prohibited from hiring any new full-time state classified civil service employees and prohibited from filling any vacant state 25 26 classified civil service positions. This hiring freeze does not apply to internal transfers of classified employees from one position to 27 28 another within a department or to positions that are funded with 80% or 29 more federal or restricted funds.

Sec. 207. The department may carry into the succeeding fiscal year unexpended federal pass-through funds to local institutions and governments that do not require additional state matching funds. Federal pass-through funds to local institutions and governments that are received in amounts in addition to those included in part 1 and that do not require additional state matching funds are appropriated for the purposes intended.

25 Sec. 208. The department shall provide the state budget director 26 and the senate and house fiscal agencies with copies of the state board 27 of education agenda and all supporting documents at the time the agenda 28 and supporting documents are provided to state board of education 29 members.

30 Sec. 209. Money in the school loan exception fee fund that is 31 unexpended at the end of the fiscal year shall not revert to the 32 general fund but shall be carried over to the succeeding fiscal year. 33 Sec. 210. 3 Sec. 301. (1) The appropriations in part 1 for state board of 4 education, per diem payments may be used for payments to members of boards, committees, and commissions for each day's board, committee, or 5 commission work at which a quorum is present; for attending a hearing б 7 as authorized by the respective board, committee, or commission; or for 8 performing official business as authorized by the respective board, 9 committee, or commission. The per diem payments shall be at a rate as 10 follows:

17 (3) The administrative secretary of the state board of education 18 shall report to the public, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and 19 the state budget director the previous quarter's expenses by fund 20 source for members of the state board of education related to the 21 performance of their responsibilities.

22 Sec. 302. (1) From the amount appropriated in part 1 to the state 23 board of education, not more than \$27,500.00 shall be expended for 24 travel.

(2) The state board of education shall not expend amounts for
 travel appropriated from DED-OVAE, basic grants to states.

Sec. 303. (1) From the amount appropriated in part 1 for innovation and community service operations, there is allocated \$500,000.00 and 5.0 FTE positions to operate a charter school office to administer charter school legislation and associated regulations, and to coordinate the activities of the department relating to charter schools.

33 (2) From the amount appropriated in part 1 for state
34 board/superintendent operations, there is allocated up to \$250,000.00
35 to fund an exchange program between teachers in Michigan school

1 districts and public school academies and teachers in Michigan's sister

2 state of Shiga in Japan.

3 TECHNOLOGY AND INFORMATION SERVICES

Sec. 401. Included in the appropriation for technology and
information services in part 1 is \$50,000.00 to publish and distribute
the Michigan school report.

Sec. 402. The department shall coordinate with the Michigan
information center on the development of an educational information
system.

10 STANDARDS, ASSESSMENT, AND ACCREDITATION SERVICES

Sec. 501. (1) From the allocations in part 1 for test development and administration, the department shall provide tests to nonpublic schools and home-schooled students upon request. The department shall notify nonpublic schools that they are eligible to receive the tests without cost to them.

16 (2) The department shall release test results at the same time to17 all private schools and public school districts taking the tests.

18 MICHIGAN SCHOOLS FOR THE DEAF AND BLIND

Sec. 601. The employees at the Michigan schools for the deaf and blind who work on a school year basis shall be considered annual employees for purposes of service credits, retirement, and insurance benefits.

Sec. 602. For each student enrolled at the Michigan schools for the deaf and blind, the department shall assess the intermediate school district of residence 100% of the cost of operating the student's instructional program. The amount shall exclude room and board related costs and the cost of weekend transportation between the school and the student's home.

Sec. 603. (1) The department may assess rent to any state government agency for the use of facilities at the Michigan school for the blind's former site in Lansing. The rental rates and all leasing arrangements shall be subject to the approval of the department of management and budget. In addition, the facilities at the Lansing site may also be available for rent to private or publicly funded organizations.

1 (2) In addition to those funds appropriated in part 1, the 2 department may receive and expend additional funds from lease 3 agreements at the Michigan school for the blind's former site in 4 Lansing that have been negotiated with the approval of the department 5 of management and budget. These funds are appropriated to the 6 department for operation, maintenance, and renovation expenses 7 associated with the leased space.

8 (3) The unexpended balances of appropriations and any surplus 9 restricted revenue for Michigan school for the blind's former site in 10 Lansing shall not lapse to the state general fund at the end of the 11 fiscal year. Any unexpended and unencumbered funds remaining on 12 September 30, 2000, shall be carried forward as a work project or as 13 restricted revenue and expended for special maintenance and repairs of 14 facilities at the Michigan school for the blind's former site in 15 Lansing. The work shall be carried out by state employees, or by contract as necessary, at an estimated cost of \$100,000.00. 16 The 17 estimated completion date of the work is September 30, 2001.

Sec. 604. (1) The department may assess rent or lease excess property located on the campus of the Michigan schools for the deaf and blind in Flint to private or publicly funded organizations.

(2) In addition to those funds appropriated in part 1, the department may receive and expend additional funds from lease agreements at the Michigan schools for the deaf and blind Flint campus that have been negotiated with the approval of the department of management and budget. These funds are appropriated to the department for the operation, maintenance, and renovation expenses associated with the leased space.

(3) Proceeds from the sale of surplus property and facilities at
the Michigan schools for the deaf and blind or at camp Tuhsmeheta are
hereby appropriated for the purposes of repairs, renovations, and
maintenance of the Flint campus.

32 (4) The unexpended balances of appropriations for school for deaf 33 and blind operations, and from proceeds of the sale of surplus property 34 and facilities at the Michigan schools for the deaf and blind and at 35 camp Tuhsmeheta shall not lapse to the state general fund at the end of

the fiscal year. Any unexpended and unencumbered funds remaining on September 30, 2000, shall be carried forward as a work project or as restricted revenue and expended for special maintenance and repairs of facilities at the campus of the Michigan schools for the deaf and blind in Flint. The work shall be carried out by state employees, or by contract as necessary, at an estimated cost of \$250,000.00. The estimated completion date of the work is September 30, 2001.

8 Sec. 605. The department may assist the department of community 9 health, other departments, and local school districts to secure 10 reimbursement for eligible services provided in Michigan schools from 11 the federal medicaid program. The department may submit reports of 12 direct expenses related to this effort to the department of community 13 health for reimbursement.

14 **PROFESSIONAL PREPARATION SERVICES**

Sec. 701. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for professional preparation services, the department shall maintain the professional personnel register and certificate revocation/felony conviction files.

18 **GRANTS AND DISTRIBUTIONS**

19 Sec. 801. The department shall disburse the funds to a general fund 20 grantee in accordance with the same standards of timing and amount that 21 apply to disbursements made by the department to a federal fund grantee. The disbursement shall be restricted to the minimum amount 22 23 needed for immediate disbursement by the grantee. The department may 24 waive this section if extenuating circumstances warrant and are 25 substantiated in the grantee's application or other appropriate 26 documentation. A waiver granted pursuant to this section shall not be 27 effective until 15 days after written notice of the proposed waiver is 28 given to the state budget director and the chairpersons of the senate 29 and house appropriations subcommittees having jurisdiction over the 30 department budget.

31 Sec. 802. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 for school breakfast 32 programs shall be made available to all eligible applicant public 33 school districts and public school academies as follows:

34 (a) The district or public school academy participates in the35 federal school breakfast program and meets all standards as prescribed

4 (c) The payment for a district or public school academy is at a per meal rate equal to the lesser of the district's or public school 5 academy's actual cost, or 100% of the cost of a breakfast served by an 6 7 efficiently operated breakfast program as determined by the department, 8 less federal reimbursement, participant payments, and other state 9 reimbursement. Determination of efficient cost by the department shall 10 be determined by using a statistical sampling of statewide and regional 11 cost as reported in a manner approved by the department for the 12 preceding school year.

(d) The payment determined under subdivision (c) is prorated if the
appropriation in part 1 is not sufficient to fund all payments
determined under this section.

Sec. 803. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 for school readiness programs shall be made available through a competitive application process as follows:

19 (a) An applicant may be any public or private nonprofit legal 20 entity or agency other than a local or intermediate school district 21 except a local or intermediate school district acting as a fiscal agent 22 for a child caring organization regulated under 1973 PA 116, MCL 23 722.111 to 722.128.

(b) Applications shall be submitted in a form and manner asrequired by the department.

(c) Applications shall be reviewed by a diverse interagency committee composed of representatives of the department, appropriate community, volunteer, and social service agencies and organizations, and parents.

30 (d) Priority in the recommendation for awarding of grants by the
31 state board of education to applicants shall be based upon the
32 following criteria:

(i) Compliance with standards for early childhood development
 consistent with programs for 4-year-olds, as approved by the state
 board of education.

(ii) Active and continuous involvement of the parents or guardians
 of the children participating in the program.

3 (iii) Employment of teachers possessing proper training in early
4 childhood development, including an early childhood (ZA) endorsement or
5 child development associate, and trained support staff.

6 (iv) Evidence of collaboration with the community of providers in 7 early childhood development programs including documentation of the 8 total number of children in the community who would meet the criteria 9 established in subparagraph (vi), and who are being served by other 10 providers, and the number of children who will remain unserved by other 11 community early childhood programs if this program is funded.

12 (v) The extent to which these funds will supplement other federal,13 state, local, or private funds.

(vi) The extent to which these funds will be targeted to children who will be at least 4, but less than 5, years of age as of December 1 of the year in which the programs are offered and who show evidence of 2 or more "at-risk" factors as defined in the state board of education report entitled, "Children At Risk" that was adopted by the state board on April 5, 1988.

20 (e) Whether the application contains a comprehensive evaluation 21 plan that includes implementation of all program components required 22 and an assessment of the gains of children participating in an early 23 childhood development program.

24 (f) Applications shall provide for the establishment of a school 25 readiness advisory committee that shall be involved in the planning and 26 evaluation of the program and provides for the involvement of parents 27 and appropriate community, volunteer, and social service agencies and organizations. There shall be on the committee at least 1 parent or 28 29 quardian of a program participant for every 18 children enrolled in the program, with a minimum of 2 parent or guardian representatives. 30 The 31 committee shall do all of the following:

32 (i) Review the mechanisms and criteria used to determine referrals33 for participation in the school readiness program.

34 (ii) Review the health screening program for all participants.
35 (iii) Review the nutritional services provided to all participants.

(iv) Review the mechanisms in place for the referral of families to
 community social service agencies, as appropriate.

3 (v) Review the collaboration with and the involvement of
4 appropriate community, volunteer, and social service agencies and
5 organizations in addressing all aspects of education disadvantage.

6 (vi) Review, evaluate, and make recommendations for changes in the7 school readiness program.

8 (g) More than 50% of the children participating in the program 9 shall meet the income eligibility criteria for free or reduced price 10 lunch, as determined under the national school lunch act, chapter 281, 11 60 Stat. 230, 42 U.S.C. 1751 to 1753, 1755 to 1761, 1762a, 1765 to 12 1766b, and 1769 to 1769h, or meet income and all other eligibility 13 criteria for participation in the Michigan family independence agency 14 unified child day care program.

(2) Grant awards by the state board of education may be at whatever level the board determines appropriate. A grant, when combined with other sources of state revenue for this program, shall not exceed \$3,100.00 per child or the cost of the program, whichever is less.

19 (3) Except as otherwise provided, an applicant that received a 20 grant under this section in the 1998-1999 fiscal year shall receive priority for funding in 1999-2000. However, continuation of funding is 21 22 contingent on the availability of funds and documented evidence of 23 grantee compliance with standards for early childhood development 24 consistent with programs for 4-year-olds, as approved by the state 25 board of education, and with all operational, fiscal, administrative, 26 and other program requirements. After 3 years of funding, a program 27 that received a grant under this section may reapply for funding, but will compete for available funds with other new programs and other 28 29 programs also completing their third year of funding under this 30 section. A program which offers supplementary day care and thereby 31 offers full-day programs as part of its early childhood development program shall receive priority in the allocation of these competitive 32 33 funds.

34 Sec. 804. (1) The reading plan for Michigan (RPM) is a series of 35 elementary education strategies created for the purpose of improving reading skills of K-3 students so that all students are reading at an
 appropriate grade level prior to the start of the fourth grade. The
 RPM shall be developed by the department in consultation with the RPM
 advisory council as created by Executive Order 1998-4.

5 (2) In order to implement the RPM, the department shall do at least 6 all of the following:

7 (a) Develop a model summer reading program for students who will be 8 attending grades 1 through 4 in the following school year and who have 9 demonstrated the need for additional reading skills training, as 10 evidenced by standardized test results on tests approved by the 11 department for this purpose. The model reading program shall be in 12 conformance with the national education goals and shall also meet 13 criteria for DED-OESE, Title I program funding.

(b) Recommend diagnostic tools and student assessments to local
districts to determine reading readiness and ensure progress in reading
skills.

17 (c) Develop and disseminate reading readiness kits to parents of 18 students in preschool and kindergarten to provide parents with 19 information about how they can prepare their children for reading 20 success.

(d) Develop and make available a statewide resource guide of public and private service providers to assist parents in improving their children's reading skills.

(3) The funds appropriated in part 1 for the reading plan for
Michigan grants shall be allocated by the department on a competitive
grant basis to districts, intermediate districts, or consortia of
districts which meet the following criteria:

(a) The district must offer a summer reading program based upon the
model reading program developed by the department pursuant to
subsection (2) beginning after the close of the 1998-99 school year.

31 (b) The district must identify money from other sources available 32 to the district which will be used to support at least 50% of the total 33 costs of the summer reading program.

(4) Applications for funding must be submitted to the department nolater than December 31, 1999. The department shall notify recipients of

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1 the grants no later than March 30, 2000.

2 (5) Not later than the 2002-2003 school year, a pupil shall not be 3 promoted to the next grade level at the end of the school year if the 4 pupil has not met the standards for pupil promotion adopted by the 5 local school district.

6 Sec. 805. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for national board 7 certification, the department shall pay 1/2 of the application fee for 8 teachers who are deemed by the department by March 1, 1998 to be 9 qualified to apply to the national board for professional teaching 10 standards for professional teaching certificates or licenses and to 11 provide grants to recognize and reward teachers who receive 12 certification or licensure.
