SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 27

Senators Bullock, Geiss, Ananich, Hertel, Santana, Wojno, Alexander, McCann, Brinks, Moss, Irwin, McMorrow, Polehanki, Bayer, Chang, Zorn and Hollier offered the following concurrent resolution:

A concurrent resolution to declare that racism is a public health crisis in the state of Michigan and commit the Legislature to action and collaboration with the Governor to promote racial equity and justice throughout the entire state of Michigan.

Whereas, Racism is rooted in the foundations of the United States. From the time chattel slavery began in the 1600s, to the Jim Crow era, to the mass incarceration of Black citizens, racism has remained an endemic presence in American society. While the manifestation of prejudice has undergone structural changes over time, the underlying problem remains. People of color have been disadvantaged and subjected to hardships and outright brutality since the founding of our nation; and

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Whereas, The COVID-19 Pandemic has highlighted the stark 1 racial injustices that are still present in American society. Black 2 3 patients across the nation are dying in larger-than-expected, record numbers, and COVID-19 is killing Black people at 2.4 times 4 the rate of White people. In Michigan, Black people make up less 5 6 than 14 percent of the population, yet they account for 40 percent 7 of the COVID-19 deaths in the state; and 8 Whereas, Black people are disproportionately suffering in part 9 due to long-standing, unaddressed health disparities, as well as 10 systematic racism and other socioeconomic inequities. The Black 11 community experiences disproportionately higher rates of homelessness, incarceration, and economic hardships, which 12 13 exacerbate existing health issues; and 14 Whereas, Michigan's racist history has contributed to the 15 current health disparities that Black Michigan residents experience. Discriminatory lending practices in the 20th century, 16 known as redlining, created segregated communities in Michigan. 17 18 Black communities were limited to areas with restricted access to 19 healthy foods, clean water, and other essential resources, leading 20 to a variety of other health issues, including reduced life 21 expectancy, higher rates of infant mortality, and higher rates of 22 lead poisoning. In addition, Michigan institutions have 23 demonstrated a disregard for Black lives, as was made evident by 24 the Flint water crisis; and 25 Whereas, Governor Gretchen Whitmer, Lieutenant Governor Garlin Gilchrist and Michigan's Chief Medical Executive Dr. Joneigh 26 27 Khaldun have all publicly condemned the racism embedded in every 28 fabric of our culture, voiced support for peaceful protests to

bring issues of racism and bigotry to the forefront, and recognized

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- 1 that racial inequities are directly linked to poor health outcomes
- 2 in Black Americans; and
- 3 Whereas, Governor Whitmer signed Executive Order 2020-55 on
- 4 April 20,2020, which established the Michigan Coronavirus Task
- 5 Force on Racial Disparities to examine factors that contribute to
- 6 racial inequities and make policy recommendations on how to
- 7 meaningfully address them; and
- 8 Whereas, The privileges that other Americans experience
- 9 inhibit them from fully understanding how racism impacts citizens
- 10 of color throughout the country, including here in Michigan. Tasks
- 11 such as driving, walking, and simply breathing should not result in
- 12 citizens of color living in constant fear of being harassed,
- 13 arrested, shot, or killed as a result of racist policing; now,
- 14 therefore, be it
- 15 Resolved by the Senate (the House of Representatives
- 16 concurring), That we declare that racism is a public health crisis
- 17 in the state of Michigan and we commit to working collaboratively
- 18 with the Governor and every sector of society to develop an ongoing
- 19 strategy to address, fund, and support solutions that strategically
- 20 reduce the long-term impact that racism has on the quality of life
- 21 and health for citizens of color in the state of Michigan; and be
- 22 it further
- 23 Resolved, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the
- 24 Governor, the Lieutenant Governor, the Chief Medical Executive for
- 25 the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, and the
- 26 Director of the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services.
