## SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 124

Senators Brinks, MacGregor, Moss, Hertel, Chang, Wojno, Polehanki, McMorrow, Santana, Bullock, Alexander, McCann, Geiss, Hollier, Bayer, Ananich and Irwin offered the following resolution:

A resolution to memorialize the Congress of the United States
to help the state of Michigan, schools, and local governments
address revenue shortfalls during the COVID-19 Pandemic.

Whereas, The COVID-19 Pandemic has led to an unprecedented economic crisis in the United States. Governors across the country, including Michigan Governor Gretchen Whitmer, have ordered non-essential businesses and schools to temporarily close and mandated

that residents do not leave their homes, except for specific

 $oldsymbol{9}$  essential activities, in order to limit the spread of COVID-19 and

11 Whereas, The cost of preventing the spread of COVID-19 and

- 1 protecting Michigan's citizens has been a dramatic decline in state
- 2 tax revenue. As businesses are shut down and residents are out of
- 3 work, the projected revenue from income, sales, and other taxes has
- 4 dropped precipitously. In Michigan, projected General Fund revenue
- 5 has been reduced by \$2 billion and projected School Aid Fund
- 6 revenue has declined by \$1.2 billion for Fiscal Year 2020. Even as
- 7 businesses re-open and restrictions on movement are lifted, the
- 8 economic fallout from fighting COVID-19 will remain. Significant
- 9 budget holes are projected in Fiscal Year 2021; and
- 10 Whereas, Local governments and schools are also facing a dire
- 11 fiscal situation. In addition to falling revenues from property,
- 12 casino, and local income taxes, the fall in state revenue may
- 13 necessitate severe cuts to state revenue sharing to local
- 14 governments. Similarly, the substantial shortfall in School Aid
- 15 Fund revenue may lead to similar cuts in state funding for local
- 16 school districts; and
- 17 Whereas, While government revenues have declined, the costs of
- 18 providing some critical public services has increased as a result
- 19 of the Pandemic. About 14,000 "essential" state employees are
- 20 eliqible for extra pay on each paycheck during the crisis. Several
- 21 municipalities have enacted hazard pay for employees who are
- 22 working during the crisis. In Wayne County, sheriff's deputies are
- 23 receiving an additional \$30 per day worked with additional hazard
- 24 pay available for overtime shifts; and
- Whereas, While Congress has already enacted some federal aid
- 26 for states and local governments, its limited scope and
- 27 restrictions will be insufficient to weather the effects of the
- 28 Pandemic. Michigan is currently expected to receive about \$3.8
- 29 billion from the federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic

- 1 Security (CARES) Act, but the funds may only be used for expenses
- 2 associated with the Pandemic. In addition, since the act only
- 3 provides direct aid to local governments with a population
- 4 exceeding 500,000, only a handful of Michigan's nearly 2,000 local
- 5 units of government will be eligible for direct payments from the
- 6 federal government; and
- 7 Whereas, Increasing the flexibility states have when using
- 8 CARES Act aid will help mitigate these dramatic cuts. Allowing
- 9 states and local governments to use CARES Act funding for costs
- 10 that are not directly associated with the Pandemic will help to
- 11 address their projected revenue shortfalls. Providing flexibility
- 12 will ensure aid is available to local governments that were left
- 13 out of the CARES Act and further address state and local budget
- 14 shortfalls; now, therefore, be it
- 15 Resolved by the Senate, That we memorialize the Congress of
- 16 the United States to help the state of Michigan, schools, and local
- 17 governments address revenue shortfalls during the COVID-19
- 18 Pandemic; and be it further
- 19 Resolved, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the
- 20 Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, the
- 21 President of the United States Senate, and the members of the
- 22 Michigan congressional delegation.
