HOUSE BILL NO. 5043

September 26, 2023, Introduced by Reps. Rogers, Mueller, Brabec, Hope, Paiz, Puri, Koleszar, Steckloff, Price, Outman, Liberati, Skaggs, Andrews, Bezotte, Wozniak, Prestin, Rheingans, McFall, Morse, VanderWall and Farhat and referred to the Committee on Health Policy.

A bill to amend 1978 PA 368, entitled "Public health code,"

by amending sections 2804, 2843, 2843b, 2844, and 16221 (MCL 333.2804, 333.2843, 333.2843b, 333.2844, and 333.16221), section 2804 as amended by 2012 PA 499, section 2843 as amended by 2013 PA 79, section 2843b as added by 1986 PA 185, and section 16221 as amended by 2023 PA 47.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

1 Sec. 2804. (1) "Institution" means a public or private 2 establishment that provides inpatient medical, surgical, or

- diagnostic care or treatment or nursing, custodial, or domiciliary 1 2 care to 2 or more unrelated individuals, including an establishment to which individuals are committed by law. 3
 - (2) "Law enforcement agency" means a police agency of a city, village, or township; a sheriff's department; the department of state police; and any other governmental law enforcement agency.

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- (3) "Live birth" means that term as defined in section 1 of 7 8 the born alive infant protection act, 2002 PA 687, MCL 333.1071.
- 9 (4) "Local registrar" means the county clerk or the clerk's 10 deputy, or in the case of a city having a population of 40,000 or more, the city clerk or city department designated by the governing 11 body of the city; or a registrar appointed pursuant to under 12 section 2814. Population shall must be determined according to the 13 14 latest federal decennial census.
- 15 (5) "Miscarriage" means the spontaneous expulsion of a 16 nonviable fetus that has completed less than 20 weeks of gestation.
- (6) "Physician" means a physician licensed under part 170 or 17 part 175. 18
- 19 (7) (6) "Registration" means the acceptance by the state 20 registrar and the incorporation of certificates provided for in this part into the official vital records. 21
- 22 Sec. 2843. (1) A funeral director who first assumes custody of 23 a dead body, either personally or through his or her the funeral director's authorized agent, shall report the death. For purposes 24 25 of this subsection, "dead body" includes, but is not limited to, the body of an infant who survived an attempted abortion as 26 27 described in the born alive infant protection act, 2002 PA 687, MCL 333.1071 to 333.1073, and who later died. The funeral director or 28
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- the authorized agent shall obtain the necessary personal data from

the next of kin or the best qualified individual or source
available and shall obtain medical certification as follows:

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(a) If—Subject to subdivision (c), if the death occurred outside an institution, the medical certification portion of the death record shall must be completed and certified not later than 48 hours after death by 1 of the following: the attending physician; or in the absence of the attending physician, by a physician acting as the attending physician's authorized representative; or in the absence of an authorized representative, by the county medical examiner; or in the absence of the county medical examiner, by the county health officer or the deputy county medical examiner. If the death occurred in an institution, the medical certification shall be completed and signed not later than 48 hours after death by the attending physician; or in the absence of the attending physician, by a physician acting as the attending physician's authorized representative; or in the absence of an authorized representative, by the chief medical officer of the institution in which death occurred, after reviewing pertinent records and making other investigation as considered necessary, or by a pathologist.

(b) A physician described in subdivision (a), who for himself or herself or as an agent or employee of another individual neglects or refuses to certify a death record properly presented to him or her for certification by a funeral director or who refuses or neglects to furnish information in his or her possession, is guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment for not more than 60 days, or a fine of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00, or both.

(2) A physician described in subsection (1)(a) shall provide

- 1 the medical certification described in subsection (1) (a) within 48
- 2 hours after the death.
- 3 (i) The physician who was in charge of the decedent's care for 4 the illness or condition that resulted in the decedent's death.
- 5 (ii) In the absence of the physician under subparagraph (i), a 6 physician acting as the authorized representative of the physician 7 described under subparagraph (i).
- 8 (b) Subject to subdivision (c), if the death occurred in an 9 institution, the medical certification portion of the death record 10 must be completed and certified not later than 48 hours after death 11 by 1 of the following:
- 12 (i) The attending physician.
- 13 (ii) In the absence of the attending physician described under 14 subparagraph (i), any of the following:
- 15 (A) A physician acting as the authorized representative of the physician described in subparagraph (i).
- 17 (B) The chief medical officer of the institution in which the 18 death occurred after the chief medical officer reviews pertinent 19 records and makes other investigations considered necessary.
 - (C) A pathologist.

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- 21 (c) Notwithstanding subdivisions (a) and (b), if an
 22 investigation is required under section 2 of 1953 PA 181, MCL
 23 52.202, the medical certification portion of the death record must
 24 be completed and certified by the county medical examiner as
 25 provided in section 2844.
- 26 (2) The report described in subsection (1) must be submitted 27 using the web-based application system established by the 28 department for the registration of deaths. Beginning 1 year after 29 the effective date of the amendatory act that added this sentence,

- 1 the medical certification described in subsection (1) must be
- 2 submitted using the web-based application system established by the
- 3 department for the registration of deaths. An individual who
- 4 completes medical certifications under subsection (1) shall first
- 5 complete training provided by the department to use the web-based
- 6 application system for the registration of deaths.
- 7 (3) A death record shall must be certified by a funeral
- 8 director who is licensed under article 18 of the occupational code,
- 9 1980 PA 299, MCL 339.1801 to 339.1812, or by an individual who
- 10 holds a courtesy license under section 1806a of that act, the
- 11 occupational code, 1980 PA 299, MCL 339.1806a, and shall must be
- 12 filed with the local registrar of the district where the death
- 13 occurred within 72 hours after the death.
- 14 (4) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, the death
- 15 of an infant who was born alive following an attempted abortion and
- 16 was surrendered to an emergency service provider under the safe
- 17 delivery of newborns law, sections 1 to 20 of chapter XII of the
- 18 probate code of 1939, 1939 PA 288, MCL 712.1 to 712.20, and then
- 19 died shall must be reported in the same manner as for any death.
- 20 However, the deceased infant shall must be listed as "Baby Doe" and
- 21 no information that would directly identify the deceased infant or
- 22 the deceased infant's parents shall be reported, including, but not
- 23 limited to, the following information:
- 24 (a) The name of the mother or father.
- 25 (b) The address of the mother or father.
- 26 (c) The name of the informant.
- 27 (d) The address of the informant.
- 28 (5) A physician who is described in subsection (1)(a) or (b)
- 29 and who is properly presented a medical certification by a funeral

- director, shall not neglect or refuse to certify the death record and shall not neglect or refuse to furnish information in the physician's possession to the funeral director.
- 4 Sec. 2843b. (1) If, at the time of death, a physician an 5 individual who is required to complete the medical certification 6 under section 2843(1)(a) 2843(1) has actual knowledge of the 7 presence in the deceased individual of an infectious agent, 8 including acquired immunodeficiency syndrome-related virus, the 9 physician individual who is required to complete the medical 10 certification shall notify the funeral director or the funeral 11 director's authorized agent of the appropriate infection control precautions to be taken. The notification required by this 12 subsection shall must occur before the body is released to the 13 14 funeral director or the funeral director's authorized agent. A 15 funeral director or funeral director's authorized agent who 16 receives notification under this subsection shall not refuse to render services as a result of having received the notification. 17 18 This subsection shall take takes effect on the effective date of 19 the rules required by subsection (3).
 - (2) The information contained in the notification required by subsection (1) shall be is confidential. A person who receives confidential information under this section shall disclose the information to others only to the extent consistent with the authorized purpose for which the information was obtained.

- 7 Sec. 2844. (1) When death occurs more than 10 days after the 8 deceased was last seen by a physician, if the cause of death 9 appears to be other than the illness or condition for which the 10 deceased was being treated, or if the attending physician cannot 11 accurately determine the cause of death, the case shall be referred 12 to the county medical examiner for investigation to determine and 13 certify the cause of death. If the county medical examiner 14 determines that the case does not fall within his or her 15 jurisdiction, the county medical examiner shall refer the case back 16 to the deceased's physician within 24 hours for completion of the 17 medical certification.

- 4 Sec. 16221. Subject to section 16221b, the department shall
- 5 investigate any allegation that 1 or more of the grounds for

- 7 investigate activities related to the practice of a health

- v (v) Conviction of a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment for
- 6 a maximum term of 2 years; conviction of a misdemeanor involving
- 7 the illegal delivery, possession, or use of a controlled substance;
- 8 or conviction of any felony other than a felony listed or described
- 9 in another subparagraph of this subdivision. A certified copy of
- 10 the court record is conclusive evidence of the conviction.
- 11 (vi) Lack of good moral character.
- 12 (vii) Conviction of a criminal offense under section 520e or
- 13 520g of the Michigan penal code, 1931 PA 328, MCL 750.520e and
- 14 750.520g. A certified copy of the court record is conclusive
- 15 evidence of the conviction.
- 16 (viii) Conviction of a violation of section 492a of the Michigan
- 17 penal code, 1931 PA 328, MCL 750.492a. A certified copy of the
- 18 court record is conclusive evidence of the conviction.
- 19 (ix) Conviction of a misdemeanor or felony involving fraud in
- 20 obtaining or attempting to obtain fees related to the practice of a
- 21 health profession. A certified copy of the court record is
- 22 conclusive evidence of the conviction.
- 23 (x) Final adverse administrative action by a licensure,
- 24 registration, disciplinary, or certification board involving the
- 25 holder of, or an applicant for, a license or registration regulated
- 26 by another state or a territory of the United States, by the United
- 27 States military, by the federal government, or by another country.
- 28 A certified copy of the record of the board is conclusive evidence
- 29 of the final action.

- 1 (xi) Conviction of a misdemeanor that is reasonably related to
 2 or that adversely affects the licensee's or registrant's ability to
 3 practice in a safe and competent manner. A certified copy of the
 4 court record is conclusive evidence of the conviction.
- 5 (xii) Conviction of a violation of section 430 of the Michigan 6 penal code, 1931 PA 328, MCL 750.430. A certified copy of the court 7 record is conclusive evidence of the conviction.
- 8 (xiii) Conviction of a criminal offense under section 83, 84,
 9 316, 317, 321, 520b, 520c, 520d, or 520f of the Michigan penal
 10 code, 1931 PA 328, MCL 750.83, 750.84, 750.316, 750.317, 750.321,
 11 750.520b, 750.520c, 750.520d, and 750.520f. A certified copy of the
 12 court record is conclusive evidence of the conviction.
- (xiv) Conviction of a violation of section 136 or 136a of the
 Michigan penal code, 1931 PA 328, MCL 750.136 and 750.136a. A
 certified copy of the court record is conclusive evidence of the
 conviction.
- 17 (xv) Conviction of a violation of section 90 of the Michigan 18 penal code, 1931 PA 328, MCL 750.90, or a violation of a state or 19 federal crime that is substantially similar to the violation 20 described in this subparagraph. A certified copy of the court 21 record is conclusive evidence of the conviction.
- (c) Prohibited acts, consisting of 1 or more of the following:
- (i) Fraud or deceit in obtaining or renewing a license or registration.
- (ii) Permitting a license or registration to be used by an unauthorized person.
- 27 (iii) Practice outside the scope of a license.
- 28 (iv) Obtaining, possessing, or attempting to obtain or possess 29 a controlled substance or a drug as defined in section 7105 without

- 1 lawful authority; or selling, prescribing, giving away, or
- 2 administering drugs for other than lawful diagnostic or therapeutic
- 3 purposes.
- 4 (d) Except as otherwise specifically provided in this section,
- 5 unethical business practices, consisting of 1 or more of the
- 6 following:
- 7 (i) False or misleading advertising.
- 8 (ii) Dividing fees for referral of patients or accepting
- 9 kickbacks on medical or surgical services, appliances, or
- 10 medications purchased by or in behalf of patients.
- (iii) Fraud or deceit in obtaining or attempting to obtain third
- 12 party reimbursement.
- 13 (e) Except as otherwise specifically provided in this section,
- 14 unprofessional conduct, consisting of 1 or more of the following:
- 15 (i) Misrepresentation to a consumer or patient or in obtaining
- 16 or attempting to obtain third party reimbursement in the course of
- 17 professional practice.
- 18 (ii) Betrayal of a professional confidence.
- 19 (iii) Promotion for personal gain of an unnecessary drug,
- 20 device, treatment, procedure, or service.
- 21 (iv) Either of the following:
- 22 (A) A requirement by a licensee other than a physician or a
- 23 registrant that an individual purchase or secure a drug, device,
- 24 treatment, procedure, or service from another person, place,
- 25 facility, or business in which the licensee or registrant has a
- 26 financial interest.
- 27 (B) A referral by a physician for a designated health service
- 28 that violates 42 USC 1395nn or a regulation promulgated under that
- 29 section. For purposes of this subdivision, 42 USC 1395nn and the

- 1 regulations promulgated under that section as they exist on June 3,
- 2 2002 are incorporated by reference. A disciplinary subcommittee
- 3 shall apply 42 USC 1395nn and the regulations promulgated under
- 4 that section regardless of the source of payment for the designated
- 5 health service referred and rendered. If 42 USC 1395nn or a
- 6 regulation promulgated under that section is revised after June 3,
- 7 2002, the department shall officially take notice of the revision.
- 8 Within 30 days after taking notice of the revision, the department
- 9 shall decide whether or not the revision pertains to referral by
- 10 physicians for designated health services and continues to protect
- 11 the public from inappropriate referrals by physicians. If the
- 12 department decides that the revision does both of those things, the
- 13 department may promulgate rules to incorporate the revision by
- 14 reference. If the department does promulgate rules to incorporate
- 15 the revision by reference, the department shall not make any
- 16 changes to the revision. As used in this sub-subparagraph,
- 17 "designated health service" means that term as defined in 42 USC
- 18 1395nn and the regulations promulgated under that section and
- 19 "physician" means that term as defined in sections 17001 and 17501.
- (v) For a physician who makes referrals under 42 USC 1395nn or
- 21 a regulation promulgated under that section, refusing to accept a
- 22 reasonable proportion of patients eligible for Medicaid and
- 23 refusing to accept payment from Medicaid or Medicare as payment in
- 24 full for a treatment, procedure, or service for which the physician
- 25 refers the individual and in which the physician has a financial
- 26 interest. A physician who owns all or part of a facility in which
- 27 the physician provides surgical services is not subject to this
- 28 subparagraph if a referred surgical procedure the physician
- 29 performs in the facility is not reimbursed at a minimum of the

- appropriate Medicaid or Medicare outpatient fee schedule, includingthe combined technical and professional components.

- 4 the health professional is acting within the health profession for
- 5 which the health professional is licensed or registered, including
- 6 conduct initiated by a patient or to which the patient consents,
- 7 that is sexual or may reasonably be interpreted as sexual,
- 8 including, but not limited to, sexual intercourse, kissing in a
- 9 sexual manner, or touching of a body part for any purpose other
- 10 than appropriate examination, treatment, or comfort.
- 11 (vii) Offering to provide practice-related services, such as
- 12 drugs, in exchange for sexual favors.
- (viii) A violation of section 16655(4) by a dental therapist.
- 14 (f) Failure to notify under section 16222(3) or (4).
- 15 (g) Failure to report a change of name or mailing address as 16 required in section 16192.
