SENATE RESOLUTION NO.79

Senators Webber, Runestad, Chang, Polehanki, Camilleri, Johnson, Bayer, McMorrow, Huizenga and Shink offered the following resolution: 1 A resolution to recognize the historic, cultural, and 2 religious significance of the festival of Diwali. Whereas, Diwali is celebrated annually every autumn by Hindus, 3 Sikhs, and Jains in Michigan, the United States, and throughout the 4 5 world, with over one billion celebrants marking the holiday; and 6 Whereas, Diwali is a holy day, during which celebrants light 7 small oil lamps and place them around the home. The lighting of the 8 lamps is followed by prayers for attainment of health, wealth, knowledge, peace, and valor, and is recognized as the beginning of 9 10 a new year for some Hindus; and Whereas, "Diwali" is a shortened version of the Sanskrit word 11

- "Deepavali", which means a row of lamps, and in English is referred 1 2 to as the "festival of lights;" and Whereas, Celebrants of Diwali believe that the rows of lamps 3 symbolize the light within the individual that rids the soul of the 4 5 darkness of ignorance; and 6 Whereas, For Hindus, Diwali is a celebration of the belief 7 that light triumphs over darkness and good triumphs over evil; and 8 Whereas, For Sikhs, Diwali is feted as the day that the sixth 9 founding Sikh Guru, or revered teacher, Guru Hargobind, was 10 released from captivity by the Mughal Emperor Jehangir; and 11 Whereas, For Jains, Diwali marks the anniversary of the attainment of moksha or liberation by Lord Mahavira, the last of 12 the Tirthankaras, who was the great teacher of Jain Dharma at the 13 14 end of his life in 527 B.C.; and 15 Whereas, Michigan remains resolute in its commitment to fostering diversity of experience and religious acceptance; and 16 17 Whereas, Diwali is a time marked by qualities of togetherness, family, and community; now, therefore, be it 18 19 Resolved by the Senate, That the members of this legislative 20 body recognize the historic, cultural, and religious significance of the festival of Diwali. We recognize the Diwali message of 21 tolerance, compassion, and acceptance of others which resonates 22
- 23 with the ideals of the American spirit; and be it further 24 Resolved, That we express respect and admiration to all those 25 who celebrate Diwali throughout the world and in our own 26

communities.
